

For two generations no one has read these lines without thrilling to their beauty, and feeling the depth of their stirring spirit. And surely the splendid woman who wrote the magnificent "Battle Hymn of the Republic" should go down as one of the distinguished women of American history as well as letters'.

Julia Ward was the daughter of Samuel Ward. one of New York's most prominent bankers.

She was born on the site of what is now the United States custom house at Bowling Green, New York. This was at the time the most fashionable residential section of the

In 1843 this popular young girl, who was born in the very best society in America, married into a fine Boston family. Her husband was Dr. S. G. Howe, whose work among the deaf and dumb made him a prominent figure in the United States.


