Summer fashions have shaped themselves now along definite lines, and the clever woman can begin planning her frocks for that season while the most attractive lines of material in the stores are yet unbroken.

You'll be sure to want a dotted-swiss, and you can always use a calico model for mornings and very informal wear. Here are two models which are simply made and which you can copy in a variety of colors and materials. You might substitute

voile and gingham or figured-sateen. At the left, the frock is of white dotted-swiss, which adds much to its daintiness by using narrow lace of yellow and white. The neckline dips lower in front than the ordinary Dutch neck, and the buttons which fasten the front are of pearl. The hat is a leghorn with velvet bow and the shoes are kid.

The frock of calico presents a vivid color scheme. Its background is of deep orange, while over it is scattered a spray design in blood-red. It is bound about in solid color calico of matching red.

Was the First Minister.
When the pioneers of the Burnbrae district raised the standard of Presbyterianism in 1836 there was only one church between Cobourg and Belleville. It was a hard task to secure a settled minister but in 1840 a young missionary from Kingston, Rev. Dr. Robert Neill, who visited the district to hold services in some of the houses, accepted an invitation to remain among them. He remained there until his death fifty years later, and his grave, the place chosen by himself as his last resting place, marks the site of the first Presbyterian church ever erected in Burnbrae.

HEROINES OF HISTORY

Significant Incidents in the Lives of Famous Women.

How Julia Ward Howe Wrote "Battle Hymn of the Republic."
"Mine eyes have seen the coming of the glory of the Lord. He is trampling out the vintage where the grapes of wrath are stored. He has loosed the fateful lightning of his terrible, swift sword, His truth is marching on!"

For two generations no one has read these lines without thrilling to their beauty, and feeling the depth of their stirring spirit. And surely the splendid woman who wrote the magnificent "Battle Hymn of the Republic" should go down as one of the distinguished women of American history as well as letters.

Julia Ward was the daughter of Samuel Ward, one of New York's most prominent bankers.

She was born on the site of what is now the United States custom house at Bowling Green, New York. This was at the time the most fashionable residential section of the city.

In 1843 this popular young girl, who was born in the very best society in America, married into a fine Boston family. Her husband was Dr. S. C. Howe, whose work among the deaf and dumb made him a prominent figure in the United States.

Immediately her house became the meeting place for all the distinguished people of Boston. Of this Mrs. Howe wrote:

"When I think of it, I believe I had a salon once upon a time. I did not call it so, nor even think of it as such; yet within it were gathered people who represented many and various aspects of life. They were real people, not lay figures distinguished by names and clothes."

It was in the early days of the Civil War, when Mrs. Howe was visiting in Washington, that she went to see the federal troops reviewed.

The brave fellows were singing "John Brown's Body." Mrs. Howe

could not control her emotions as she watched them swinging along and heard them singing with joy in their hearts because they were giving their lives to keep united a great nation.

As she listened to their strong young voices the tears streamed down her cheeks.

Her friend, James Freeman Clark, who knew that she had literary talent, was standing next to her, and said:

"You ought to write some new words to that tune."

She chokingly replied:

"I will."

That night she slept. Early in the morning she awoke and—as though the words had come in a dream—quickly penned the splendid battle hymn, which was sung all over the country.

Many thought it should have been the national anthem, for it was sung around camp-fires, in prisons and by tired, marching soldiers.

Until she was seventy years old Mrs. Howe was seen on the lecture platform—for she worked for women suffrage and international arbitration. She often appeared before the legislatures of the various states, helping improve the laws of her country.

And always on these occasions she was asked to head her splendid "Battle Hymn of the Republic," which she had been inspired to write,

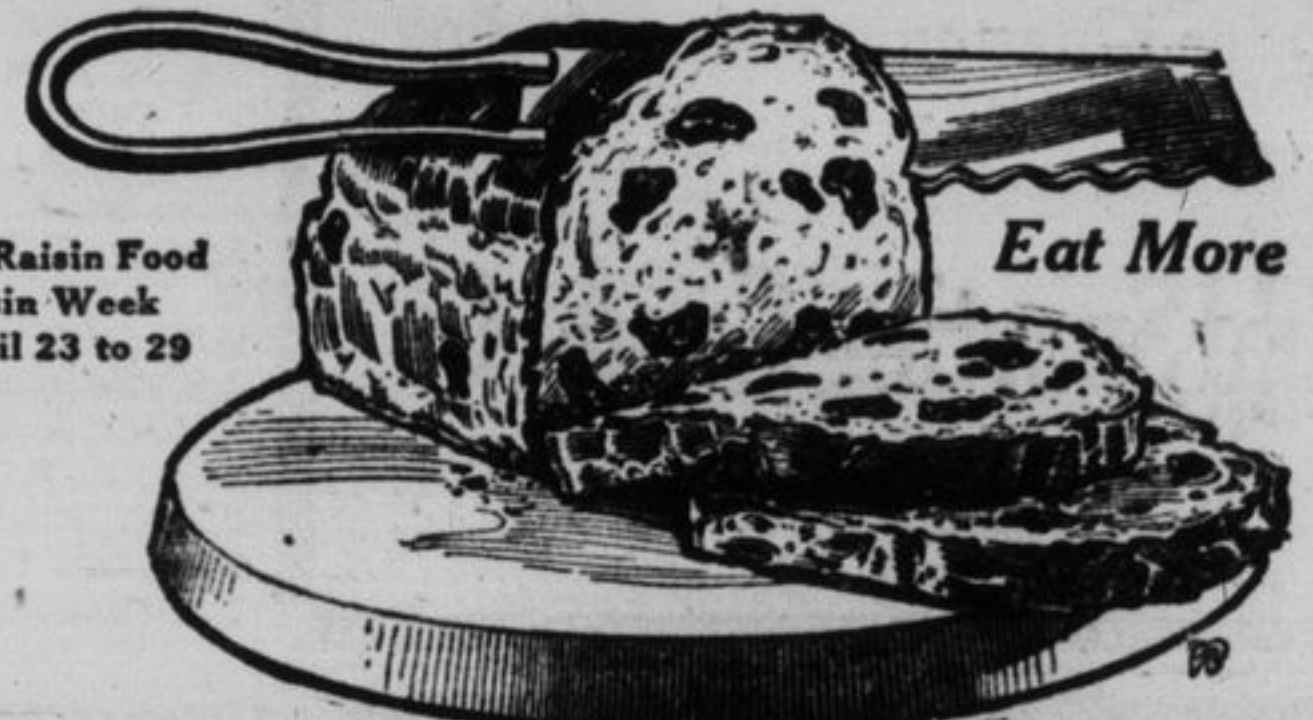
