CHILD'S STORY OF THE HUMAN RACE

Chapter 20—Early Attempts at Painting.

Even before you began to go to school, you probably did some scratching with a lead pencil. You did the best you could, and perhaps you thought you were making very good pictures. When you became older, you were able to do better and better. Possibly you at first drew a man as if he were just a head fastened to two legs (as I once observed some 6-year old children doing.) The time came when you knew better. You drew a man with a body and arms, as well as a head and legs. No doubt you also drew in a collar, a tie and shirt buttons.

I am trying to bring back to you the memory of your first attempt to draw, because they were something like the attempts of Stone Age persons.

Someone learned that burnt wood left black marks when rubbed against things. A charred stick was very likely the first pencil. Later on, other ways to make marks were learned.

Let us take a good look at the pictures before us today. They are copies of sketches made on the walls of caves. One shows a mammoth. It was painted in red in a cavern near Pindal, Spain. The queerest thing about it is the big spot a little way behind the head. The artist probably meant that either for the heart or for an ear.


The mammoth had very long tusks, but the painting shows no tusks at all! Only two legs are to be seen—the earliest Stone Age artists did not know how to show the legs on the other side.

Later paintings of mammoths in other caves are much more true to life.


Another picture is copied from the walls of a French cave. The animal is a two-horned rhinoceros. The hind legs were made fairly distinct, but the front ones were run together. Notice the short, slanting lines above and below. They were made in an effort to show the thickness of the animal.

The rhinoceros was seldom drawn by cavemen. Most of the big creatures had died off or gone south (over the African land bridge) by the time the art of painting was practiced in Spain and France.


The third picture is of a galloping horse. It was made on the wall of a cave after Stone Age artists had better mastered the art of painting.

MIRAGE PLAINLY SEEN AT SACKETT HARBOR
Objects on Bay of Quinte Were Reflected Eighty-six Miles.

A mirage of Indian Point and Amherst Island at the end of the Bay of Quinte, 86 miles from Sackett Harbor, was clearly visible there on Friday morning. The light house and the sand beach on Indian Point could be seen.

The mirage was first noticed shortly after eleven. It continued for about half an hour, gradually fading away. The image was about 100 feet from the level of Lake Ontario and the natural colors of the objects were well retained. The sand beach appeared perfectly white. The light-house is gray but in the mirage it appeared lighter in color. Indian Point and Amherst Point are in southern Ontario.

Mirages are generally seen here at least once each year. They generally appear between the middle and last of April, although sometimes coming in November. They are caused by atmospheric conditions as the sun mounts higher. Usually they precede a strong northeast wind.

Although mirages are often inverted, the image seen this morning was not. This was due no doubt to atmospheric conditions and the surface of the lake, which served as a huge reflector. Last year a mirage of the city of Kingston, Ont., was seen inverted. The year previous Oswego was seen but not inverted.

Help The Assessors
On Tuesday, the first of May, the city assessor and his assistants start out on their yearly rounds to assess Kingston. In order that they may secure a record of every man, woman and child living in the city, householders should give them all the information they can. It is desirable that the true population of Kingston should be shown, and there is an impression that the number of persons in many households are not given to the assessors. Nothing is gained by withholding such information. Help boost the population figures by giving the city's officials what they seek.

Kingstonian Makes Change
After a continuous service of eighteen years with the First National Bank at Silverton, Marion County, Oregon, J. W. Hyett, a well-known Kingstonian, who left Kingston in 1905, has tendered his resignation and has been appointed to the vice-presidency and cashiership of the Cresswell and Fruit Growers Bank at Cresswell, Ore. Mr. Hyett is a graduate of the Kingston Business College and a brother-in-law of Charles Webster, barrister, of this city.

Steamer Reaches Port Arthur
Port Arthur, April 30.—The steamer America arrived in port at nine o'clock this morning from Duluth being the first to cross the lake this season. The America carries passengers and freight.
