### The Political Pot

Sam Clarke Again. Cobourg, May 4.—There is little pre-election excitement in West Northumberland up to the present time. Sam Clarke, the present member, has been returned seven times by this riding and his majority in the last election was the largest that he has ever received. He has sat in the Ontario House now for twenty-five years and his election is generally conceded if he enters the arena, as is expected, as the Liberal candidate in the coming provincial election.

War on the U. F. O. Guelph May 4.—Following a meeting of the Independent Labor Party here last night when the recent action of the U. F. O. to refuse to endorse a Labor candidate in the Provincial election despite an agreement to do so made prior to 1921 was fully discussed. President B. Durkin announced that the I. L. P. in Guelph would not only exercise all its power in an effort to defeat the Farmer candidate but that it was altogether likely that a Labor candidate would be placed in the South Wellington field.

The death occurred at Peterboro, Thursday, at Mount St. Joseph convent of one of the younger sisters of the community of the Sisters of St. Joseph, Sister Mary Malachy (formerly Miss Quilty, of Pembroke diocese). The nun, who had been only six years in the community, had suffered from a lingering illness during the last two years.
