HOMES IN COLLIN'S BAY TO USE HYDRO-ELECTRIC

Workmen Are at Present Engaged in Stringing the Wires.

It is expected that by the end of the month, the homes in Collin's Bay, will be lighted by electricity. At the present time, men employed by the Hydro-Electric Commission are stringing the electric wires to the village of Westbrooke, and the line will be brought from Westbrooke to Collin's Bay. It is the intention of Grass & Clarke, owners of the Willow Dale ice cream plant, which is located between Collin's Bay, and Westbrooke, operated by hydro-electric current. Up until the present time, about five or six places in the village have been wired for electric light, and it is only a matter of time until a large number will be ready to take the power. The two stores in the village will use hydro.

When the line is constructed to Collin's Bay, it will mean that Cataract, Westbrooke and Collin's Bay will be using hydro-electric current which is transmitted from the Kingston electric plant.

POULTRY THIEVES BUSY IN KINGSTON TOWNSHIP

Seventeen Valuable Birds Taken From Collin's Bay Resident.

During the past week poultry thieves have been very active in the township of Kingston. It is evident that the parties who are stealing the chickens know when they are getting good stock. On Saturday evening last, the hen house on the property of S. Anthony Runkle, Collin's Bay, was entered and seventeen hens were taken. The owner stated that the thieves carried away the best hens in the house.

LIKELY NOMINEES.

For Presidency of the Montreal Methodist Conference.

The proceedings of the Montreal Methodist Conference will be opened in the Methodist church, Wall street, Brookville, on June 18th, under the presidency of Rev. Dr. C. D. Baldwin, retiring president, with Rev. J. Pinel, D.D., secretary.

With regard to the presidency, ballots for which will be cast early in the session, names likely to come forward will be Rev. W. T. G. Brown, Ottawa; Rev. A. E. Runkle, Montreal; Rev. Dr. E. I. Hart, Montreal, and Rev. B. B. Brown, Sherbrooke.

The agenda provides for the usual routine reports of church departments, and beyond these does not suggest that any controversial issues will come up, unless they should arise out of reports. Church union is a matter that is in the hands of the General Conference which is a quadrennial fixture, and in any case that body has defined its position clearly in favor of the legislative proposals now before the three churches concerned.

Among special speakers who will address the conference at one time or another are the Hon. C. E. Drury, premier of Ontario, who is scheduled to speak at the laymen's banquet on May 31st, also Rev. Prof. Edmund D. Soper, professor in history of Religion, at Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., who will give several devotional addresses. Rev. Dr. S. P. Rose, of Wesleyan College, Montreal, will give the jubilee address on "The Things that Remain—a Confession of Faith," and the annual lecture of the Theological Union will be given by Rev. Roy M. Pounder, Westmount.

The stationing committee will, as usual, assemble at the conference town in advance of the sessions, starting its work on May 29th.

IN MARINE CIRCLES

The vessel of the C. S. L. Company are being overhauled and inspected by a gang of men from the Davis drydock. It is not expected that very many of these boats will be able to clear before the middle of next week.

Traffic from Cape Vincent to Kingston is beginning to increase slightly but not enough to warrant more than one regular trip of the steamer Waubesa.

The steamer Brockville is in Belleville unloading freight and will be down here again on Saturday. She will start her regular schedule next week.

Steamer Britannic Starts.
"Our steamer, the Britannic, of the Montreal and Cornwall Navigation Co., had the honor of opening the canal and lake navigation season for Montreal, as well as for Cornwall," said Purser Russell Sneltinger, of the Britannic, Wednesday, after the vessel had tied up at the foot of Dalhousie street, Montreal. "We left Cornwall at 5 o'clock in the morning," said Purser Sneltinger, "in charge of Capt. G. Hart, of Cornwall. We had little difficulty with ice on the way down until we got out of Soulages Canal, when we were delayed for three hours getting through heavy fields of ice in the upper part of Lake St. Louis, near the Soulages Canal. We had no trouble at all in the canal, nor did we encounter much ice anywhere except in the upper part of Lake St. Louis. The canals had only finished filling by noon, and we led the procession."

The Britannic is a package freighter of 225 tons net cargo, and had a full load of package freight to Montreal. This was discharged and the Britannic left Montreal again Thursday with a full cargo of package freight from Montreal firms for Kingston on her regular schedule.
