## **Urged For Australians**

Sydney, N.S.W., May 5 .- The government is being urged to abolish the present system of marriage laws and to compel the parties to enter a civil contract before a registrar, mony. Proponents of the idea also are urging that it be made an offense, punishable by fine and impris-

onment, for any person to impugn the legality of such a civil contract. The precedents of France, Italy and other countries are quoted in support of the scheme, which emphasizes the completenes of the marriage contract as made by the state and not by the church.

SHORT TERM OREDITS NEEDED.

Farmers Are Handicapped in Buying Their Cattle. Ottawa May 5 .- Before the special House committee on agriculture, Allan Farrow, chairman of the Agricultural Development Board of Ontario, urged the need of short term credits for farmers. There were many cases, Mr. Farrow said, where the farmers, requiring to buy cattle, had to do so through a third person. loan. This commission was frequently sufficient to wipe out a man's profit. In some cases dealers advanced money for cattle, and the farmer had
