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

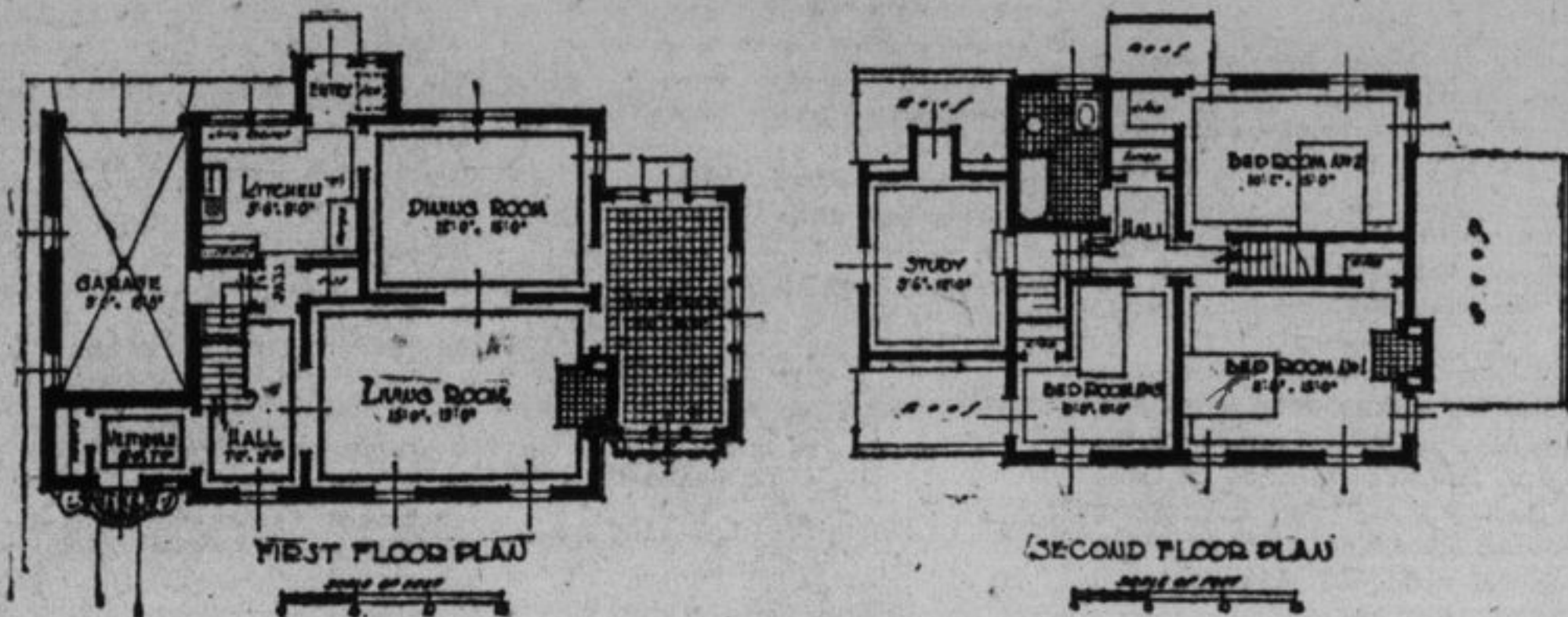
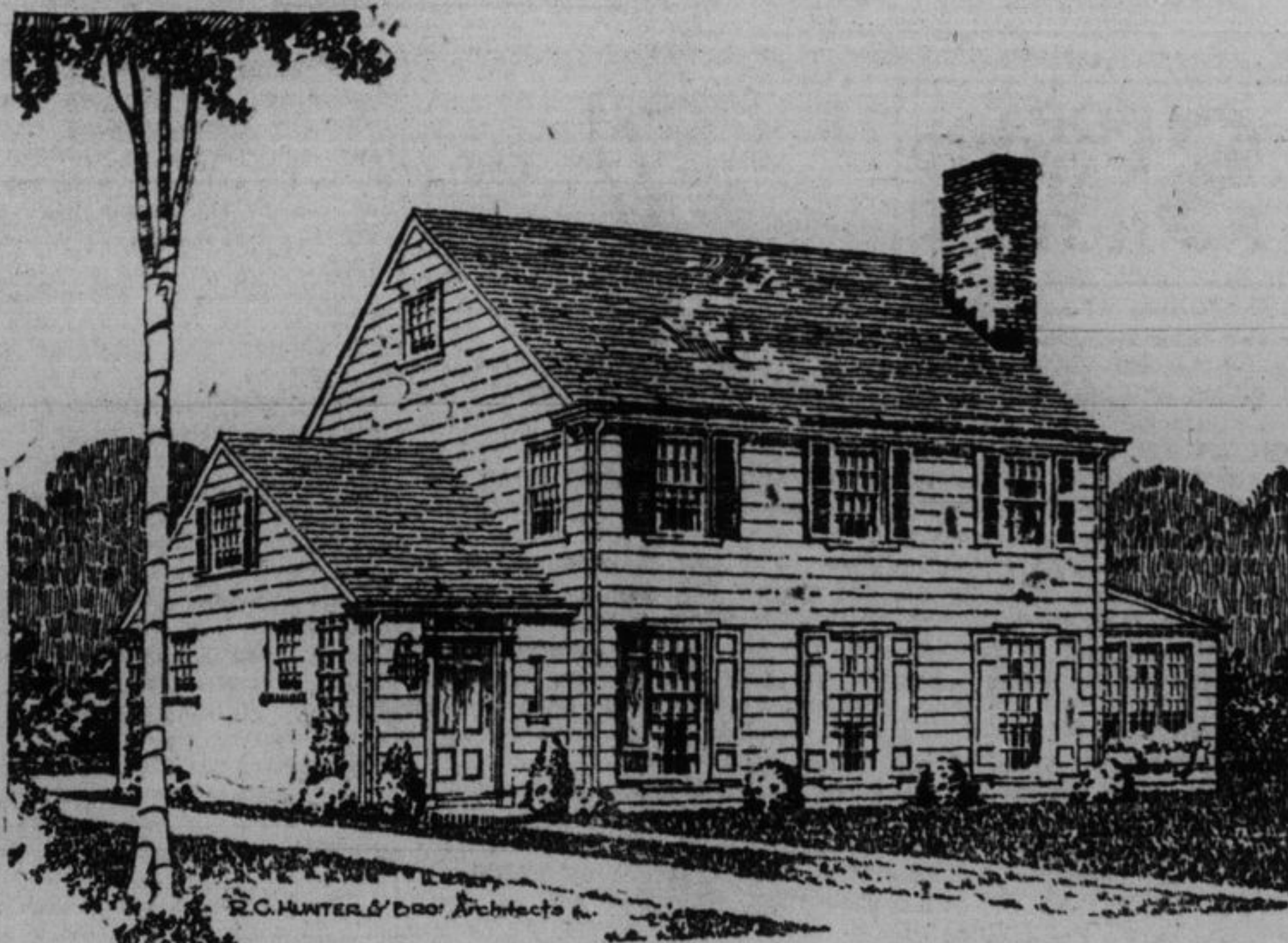

A House With Garage Attached.



What about the garage? In building the modern home this question must be answered, and for the best results it should be given thorough consideration before the house is built.

If the garage is left as an after consideration, it is often very difficult to find a satisfactory solution to this important problem.

Of course, a garage can be erected on the rear of the lot after the house is built (providing proper provision has been made for the driveway and space has been reserved for the garage) but what about convenience? Will heat be provided? Electric light, water and sewer service? The latter two are of course necessary but heating and lighting are real conveniences that are generally omitted on account of the expense.

All of these objections can be overcome by attaching the garage to the house, but, here again, due consideration must be given the design, for, if the garage is simply "butted" to the house, it ruins the appearance of the latter.

The architects have embodied beauty, convenience, comfort and economy for both garage and house, in the example herewith illustrated.

The garage entrance is on the rear. This overcomes the objections of large doors toward the street, and permits the main entrance to the house, with vestibule and coat closet, to be provided in the front of the garage extension.

The plan of the house shows an arrangement that is convenient and livable. Three bed rooms, a bath and a study are provided on the second floor.

Cost about \$3,500.

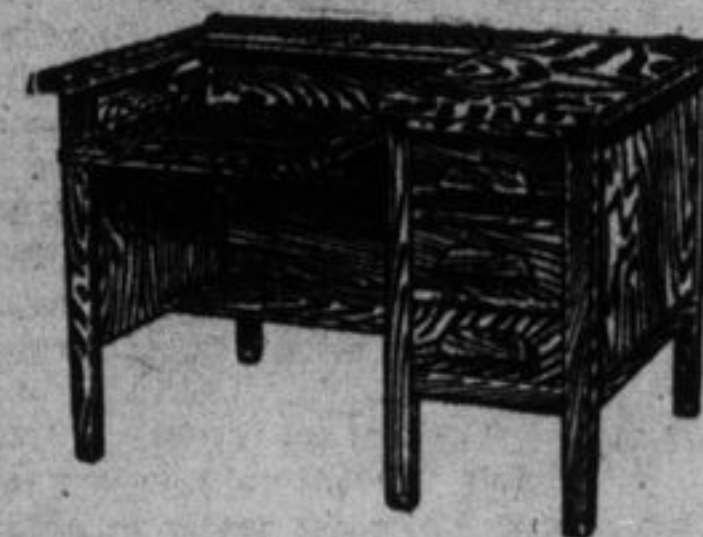
