DR. ANSON RAYMOND DEAD.
Graduate of Queen's Who Practised at Alexandria.

After a prolonged period of ill-health the death occurred at Alexandria, on Friday, of Anson L. Raymond, M.D. a leading medical practitioner of that place. Dr. Anson L. Raymond was born forty-five years ago at Williamstown, Ont., son of Mr. and Mrs. J. N. Raymond, of that place.

He was educated at the public and high schools of the district, and at Queen's University, Kingston, where he studied medicine, graduating with his M.D. degree some fifteen years ago. He had been for many years a member of the Masonic Order, and a largely-attended funeral was held at the Alexandria Presbyterian church Sunday afternoon, under the auspices of the Alexandria Lodge, A. F. & A. M.

Following the service the remains were taken to Montreal by his parents and relatives. Final ceremonies took place at Wray's Chapel on Mountain street, after which the remains were conveyed to the Mount Royal crematorium.
