### REFUSES PEACE TERMS OFFERED BY DE VALERA

Irish Free State Government Declines to Communicate Further With Him.

Dublin, May 9.—The Irish Free State government has refused the peace terms of Eamon De Valera and has declined to communicate further with the republican leader.

**Refuses Habeas Corpus.** London, May 9.—The court of appeal, to-day, granted the application for a writ of habeas corpus, made on behalf of Art O'Brien, who was deported to Ireland following the Irish raids in March. Counsel for O'Brien contended that the British home secretary had no power to send the applicant to Ireland.

**Not Binding in Ireland.** Dublin, May 9.—The decisions of the English courts are not binding in Ireland and the British home secretary may find much difficulty in carrying out the instructions to release Art O'Brien or any one hundred deportees. The attitude taken by Kevin O'Higgins, Free State minister of home affairs, may be summed up in "what we have we hold." The Irish government, it is pointed out here, got these prisoners from England in a definite bargain with the British home office and will carry out exactly the provisions of that bargain.
