The barge Hilda will enter the Davis drydock on Wednesday morning.

Marine men expect that navigation will be short this year on account of the canal locks at Sault Ste. Marie being closed owing to ice conditions. The opening of navigation this spring was hampered to an abnormal degree, and this condition was general throughout the entire inland water system. The locks will be closed officially on Nov. 14th in order to reduce the hazards due to prevailing bad weather and prevent heavy losses such as were experienced last year.

Biggest Aquarium in Europe. England is soon to have the biggest aquarium in Europe, if not in the world. It is located at the Marine Terraces in London and will be completed in June. It is to cost half a million dollars.

More than 100,000 gallons of water will be required to fill the tanks, which will contain fish and water fauna from all parts of the world. Natural sea water will be used. This will be brought from the North Sea up the Thames and taken to the zoological gardens in barges.
