DEATH AT ALLEN STATION.

Mrs. Isaac N. O'Brien Passed Away After Long Illness.

The death occurred at Allen Station, on Friday, May 11th, of Wilhelmina Merle Wood, wife of Isaac N. O'Brien, aged forty-nine years and seven months. Deceased had been in ill health since Jan. 10th, 1922. Mrs. O'Brien was born at Sydenham on October 5th, 1873, being a daughter of the late John Wood. The late Mrs. O'Brien was widely known and very highly respected. She was a member of the Methodist church at Cooper, and was also a charter member of Ruth Orange Lodge No. 409, Millbridge. Mrs. O'Brien assisted in the organization and was very active in the work of the organization. As a friend and neighbor, deceased was loved by all her acquaintances and much regret was expressed over her death. Besides her husband there are left to mourn, two sons, Allen and Claude, both at home; also three sisters Mrs. E. W. Horning, Sydenham; Mrs. T. Garrett, near Kepler; Mrs. John Broad, California; two brothers, George and James, also of California.

The funeral services took place from the late home of the deceased on Sunday, May 13th, Rev. Mr. White, of the Methodist church, on the Elorado circuit, officiating. Interment took place at Sydenham cemetery on Monday, May 14th. Many beautiful floral offerings were received showing the esteem in which the deceased was held. The collection included a wreath from the Orange Lodge with which the deceased was identified, the members sending to Belleville for it. A very large number of the members of the order attended the funeral.
