The police are notifying all the second-hand dealers in the city about the payment of their license for the year. The licenses are now due. There are still a few statute labor delinquents and notices have also been sent out for their payment.

Cobourg Merchant Bereaved.
The funeral took place at Kingston of Lawrence, son of F. R. Burns, of the Burns' shoe store which was recently established at Cobourg. The young boy, in his ninth year, had an operation for appendicitis about two weeks ago. Complications developed, which resulted in his death.

Bewailing the Weather.
The Anglican ladies are bewailing the weather at the present time, in view of the annual meeting of the Women's Missionary Auxiliary. "Every time the W. A. meets here," said a good lady, "we have rainy weather. Kingston cannot be seen at its best. But we have good meetings nevertheless."

After the Position.
The members of the Board of Education are finding a goodly number of persons applying for the secretary-treasurership which will soon be vacant. The committee in charge is to meet shortly to consider Mr. Macdonald's resignation and to arrange for advertising for a successor.

To Be Buried at Tamworth.
Gideon Joyner, aged seventy-eight, who died at the County House, Watertown, N.Y., will have his dying wish, and be buried in Canada. His friends have arranged for his remains to be sent to Tamworth. His widow resides at Nanapan. One brother, Charles, lives at Sydenham and another, Schuyler, at Picton.

Should Set a New Record.
Twenty-point advance in F. W. Woolworth common stock of 239 has been accompanied in New York, by talk of a capital readjustment, stock dividend and mergers. These are all denied. The management, however, intends strengthening the financial structure as much as possible before declaring large stock and cash dividends. Last year's net was \$17,624,393, or \$27.11 on the common. This year's net should set a new record figure for earnings a share on common.

Dangerous Work.
Many citizens who happened to be on lower Princess street on Tuesday morning were rather startled to witness the darning of two painters who were engaged near the top of the big Richardson elevator. This job, which was started Tuesday morning, requires great skill and courage, and the men must keep their wits about them while suspended in the "basket" during their task. The contract was awarded to F. Coventry, who, with two assistants, expects to have the job completed in short order.

The Late Mrs. F. R. Revoy.
The death occurred at St. Joseph's Hospital, Peterboro, on April 8th, of Jessie May, wife of Frederick R. Revoy, in her twenty-sixth year, after but three days' illness. She was born in Centreville, Camden township where she lived until eleven years ago when she moved to Peterboro with her family. She was married three years ago to F. R. Revoy, Peterboro, who together with her father, Thomas Fleming, her two sisters, Mrs. R. Shortt, and Mrs. W. Smith, Windsor, also one brother, Brien Fleming, also of Peterboro, are left to mourn. The deceased was laid to rest in Little Lake cemetery, along

with her baby boy one day old. Rev. Mr. Doner, Bethney Tabernacle, and Rev. R. Pogue, of St. Paul's Presbyterian church officiating.

Donation for Y. M. C. A.
A "Well Wisher" of the Y. M. C. A. in a letter to the secretary of the association, promises a donation of \$100, to be paid in four monthly payments commencing on June 1st. The donor of the money writes a very encouraging letter, praising the work of the association and wishing it every success in the campaign to raise \$9,000. In his letter the writer says: "I overheard a remark that if the money was not contributed, there was a great possibility of the association having to close its doors. When I thought of the latter possibility and of the only building on Princess street that throws open its doors to all men, without regard to class, or creed, being closed, it pained me and I would not for one hundred dollars have it occur."

Sent to Guelph.
Two men who came here from Ireland on Tuesday, having been engaged to work on a dairy farm near the city, found that the job they had hoped to fill had been taken by other parties. The boat on which they made the trip over was delayed by an ice jam and this prevented them from getting to Kingston on time, and it was thought that they were not coming, so their positions were not held. The men needed assistance and Mayor Angove took up their case, and later on Allan Stroud, of the employment agency, made arrangements for the young men to go on to Guelph, where they will be given employment on the agricultural farm.

30,000 Island, Georgian Bay.
A favorite summer playground for residents of Eastern Canada is the Georgian Bay. On the east side of the bay is an archipelago of innumerable islands, great and small. Although the district is known as the 30,000 Islands of the Georgian Bay, 45,000 islands have already been marked on the Government chart and this does not include all. Throughout the summer fresh cool breezes blow across from the Great Lakes. "All the firs that flesh is heir to seem to vanish in this healthful region."

No Labor Candidate.
There will be no I. L. P. candidate in Kingston during the coming election, according to the opinions of prominent members of the Kingston Labor party. In the by-election of 1921, Ald. Dr. F. J. O'Connor and ex-Ald. W. Fleet were nominated but withdrew from the contest. To-day no sections of the labor party appear to feel that the present time is opportune. If proportional representation and the single transferrable vote had passed the legislature, during the session just closed, the situation in Kingston and in other large cities would have been different.
