SAYS LUIS FIRPO WILL BEAT JESS WILLARD

That Jess Willard will be beaten when he fights Luis Firpo was the prediction made by Aid. Louis Rubenstein, chairman of the Athletic Commission, Montreal, who witnessed Saturday's heavyweight bouts in New York as the guest of promoter Tex Rickard.

"Willard beat Johnson only because of his great advantage in weight height and reach," said the Montreal chairman. "He is old and slow, but too big for men of Johnson's size. Firpo is a great, powerful bull of a man, as big and as strong as Willard. He will win when they meet."

Tex Rickard was all smiles after the bouts. The promoter had picked both Willard and Firpo to win and had announced some days ago that he would match them with each other if they came through victorious. Rickard told Aid. Rubenstein he would match Firpo and Willard as soon as possible, probably on June 30th, the Saturday before the Fourth of July.

The bout will be held at the Yankee Stadium. Rickard then plans to send the winner of the Firpo-Willard battle against Jack Dempsey in a championship bout on Labor Day at either the Yankee stadium or Boyle's Thirty Acres.

IMPORTANT DEVELOPMENTS IN PROFESSIONAL HOCKEY

In Montreal on Monday two important player deals emanated from a meeting of the National Hockey League.

Ken Randall, the one-time alleged "bad man" of professional hockey was traded to Hamilton Tigers in exchange for Bert Corbeau, the veteran defenseman, who was traded from Canadians to the Tigers last season.

The Hamilton Club was given permission by the Canadiens to enter into negotiations with "Neway" Lalonde, with a view to securing the services of the veteran for next season as coach, captain and manager of the team.

The situation at Ottawa provoked some heated passages. The Ottawa players, so it appears, have all signed with the new Arena Company and left their present owners flat. The discussion reached bitter points at times, but no action was taken.
