Fine Exhibit of Matches.
The E. B. Eddy Company, Hall, Que., has on exhibition in the window of Crawford's grocery store, a most interesting display of matches made in their factories. There are twenty-one different types of matches, and the evolution of the match from the old style sulphur type that was made from 1857 and on up to 1886, when improvements began to appear, may be studied. The sulphur match was still made but slightly improved between 1886 and 1898, and since that time progress has been very rapid. Match stems are shown, and while they appear to be merely simple pieces of wood, every piece is carefully made and before any match is packed for sale it is treated and tested for sensitiveness, size and shape, strength, prevention of afterglow, silence of strike, odor.
