Will Offer Welsh Coal In Canadian Market

Washington, May 25.—According to a report from London published by the United States Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, Welsh anthracite coal owners and exporters are making careful and considerable preparation to offer anthracite in the Canadian market in quantities and at prices which will compete strongly with American coal. The plan of the Welsh exporters is apparently to deliver large tonnage of run-of-mine anthracite at Montreal during the summer months when the St. Lawrence is open; to establish there coal wharves and coal breakers; to treat and grade the coal there; and so to supply the provinces of Ontario and Quebec regularly and promptly, according to the demand of these markets.

Hamilton, May 25.—Some weeks ago J. J. Maloney, formerly a student in a Roman Catholic college, made arrangements to speak in the Community Hall, Waterdown, and afterwards was refused the use of the hall. He spoke in the Orange Hall and a letter was published in the Waterdown Review. This morning a Supreme Court writ was issued by Hedley Snider, for Mr. Maloney asking unstated damages for alleged libel from the congregation of the St. Thomas Roman Catholic church, Waterdown, and also John O'Connor, who is said to have delivered the letter to the newspaper.

"SPICE OF 1922" PLEASSED

A Large Audience Witnessed It at

The Grand "Spice of 1922," snappy Broadway vaudeville, drew a capacity audience of the Grand Opera House Thursday evening. While two or three of the many scenes are somewhat suggestive, the production as a whole is meritorious. The principals are decidedly clever vaudeville artists, and include Eli Brendel, Sam Hearn, Arman Kaliz, Georgie Price and Flo Bert. The first named, in a Scandinavian comedy role, presented something out of the ordinary with Flo Bert and made a great hit. Sam Hearn created great laughter as the burlesque censor. Arman Kaliz is a love scene specialist, Georgie Price a good imitator and Flo Bert a fine singing comedienne. Arthur Corey gives several thrilling dance members. The Garden of Eden, a Japanese temple, a popular Dutch scene, "Spice of Montmartre" and "Spice of Scarlet" are the main scenes. Florence Browne, who appears equally well in various parts, makes a hit in the Paris side street song which is pantomimed with great effect. In most of these "episodes" there is a notable display of nakedness, but no vulgarity. A couple of the kissing scenes could be eliminated without detracting from the effectiveness of the parts, but the "censor" permitted these to pass, so he must have been satisfied. The production is gorgeous throughout and every member pleased the audience. "Spice of 1922" is all that advance reports said it was. The Kingston audience that witnessed it was well pleased and highly entertained.
