BIG C.N.R. LOCOMOTIVE LEAVES FOR MONTREAL

It Drew One Car With Various Railway Representatives Aboard.

The biggest locomotive in Canada left the shops of the Canadian Locomotive Company at 5 a.m. Friday on her maiden trip to Montreal. She drew but a single passenger coach, carrying representatives of the Canadian National Railway and the Canadian Locomotive Company.

The great locomotive was a beautiful picture as she glided over the C. N. R. line from the city to the great steel highway to Montreal. While of enormous proportions, there is nothing ungainly about the design. The lines are graceful and the mammoth boiler sits low on the driving wheels, giving the impression of compactness.

SYNOD EXECUTIVE CONSIDERS REQUESTS

Also Arranges for Memorial to the Late Bishop Lennox Mills.

A meeting of the executive of the Synod of Ontario was held on Thursday, when two auditors were appointed for the current year and permission was granted under the usual canonical requirements and chancellor's approval, to mortgage certain land in the parish of St. Luke's church, Kingston, for the purpose of remodelling the Sunday school building, and also the parish of Marmora, for the purpose of erecting a rectory.

A memorial to the late Bishop Mills was informally discussed and dealt with.

St. Luke's New Hall

At a special meeting held in St. Luke's church on Thursday evening, with regard to the proposed Sunday school hall, it was decided to proceed immediately with the plans previously outlined, and the sketch of the building will be placed in the hands of a local architect. Tenders will be called in a few days. The committee composed of J. W. Connor, Robert Reynolds and H. Jennings have spent a good deal of work on the specifications during the past few weeks.
