FREE LOVE DOCTRINE AMONG UKRAINIANS

It is Said To Be Taught in The Port Arthur Region.

Port Arthur, June 11.—Teachings of "free love" and the state care of children borne of such, were alleged to have been carried on by Ukrainian agitators from Winnipeg among the Ukrainians of the two head of the lakes cities, by witnesses in the Supreme Court at the trial of an action brought by one section of Ukrainians against another set, who are alleged to be working in conjunction with the Third Internationale of Moscow. Witnesses in the action stated they had been told they could practice free love if they joined up with the revolutionary section and that "public cradles would be provided and the children cared for by the state, leaving the women free to work."

Some years ago a settlement of Ukrainians built, halls in many sections of the country and, formed a society for the teaching of Canadian ideals and Canadian citizenship and the English language. Then followed the agitators.

By various means they secured control of the loyalists' society and are alleged to have usurped the powers of the former and to have transferred the buildings and property to the revolutionists. The case has been postponed until the fall.

AT NOTRE DAME CONVENT.

Fine Exhibition of Art and Sewing By the Pupils.

On Sunday and Monday, the parents and friends of the pupils of Notre Dame convent had an opportunity to visit the convent and view the really excellent result of the sisters' training of the art and sewing classes. Nine classes have work on exhibition, beginning with the clay modeling of the tiniest pupils who are also taught to sew neatly. Dainty garments of many kinds have been made by the pupils of every grade, and they are not only taught to sew beautifully, but to love pretty and neatly made under things. The art classes have made great progress since last year, the drawing from models with which the pupils start their course, being remarkably good. Some studies in water colors and oils by the more advanced pupils are very attractive and show that Kingston has some girls and boys who may be among the Canadian artists of the future. Several classes are from St. Vincent Academy. Some lovely china painting is shown, fired in the convent kiln.

TIPS TO HOUSEWIVES.

The first step in mahogany furniture is to keep it clean. Never try to polish it when dirty.

Surroundings to the kitchen should not be untidy. Clean paths, a well-kept garden and vistas of landscape seen from the kitchen window dispels fatigue and discontent.

If the honey should become sugar-ed, it will be smooth and clear again if the jar is placed in hot water for several hours, being careful that none of the water gets into the honey.

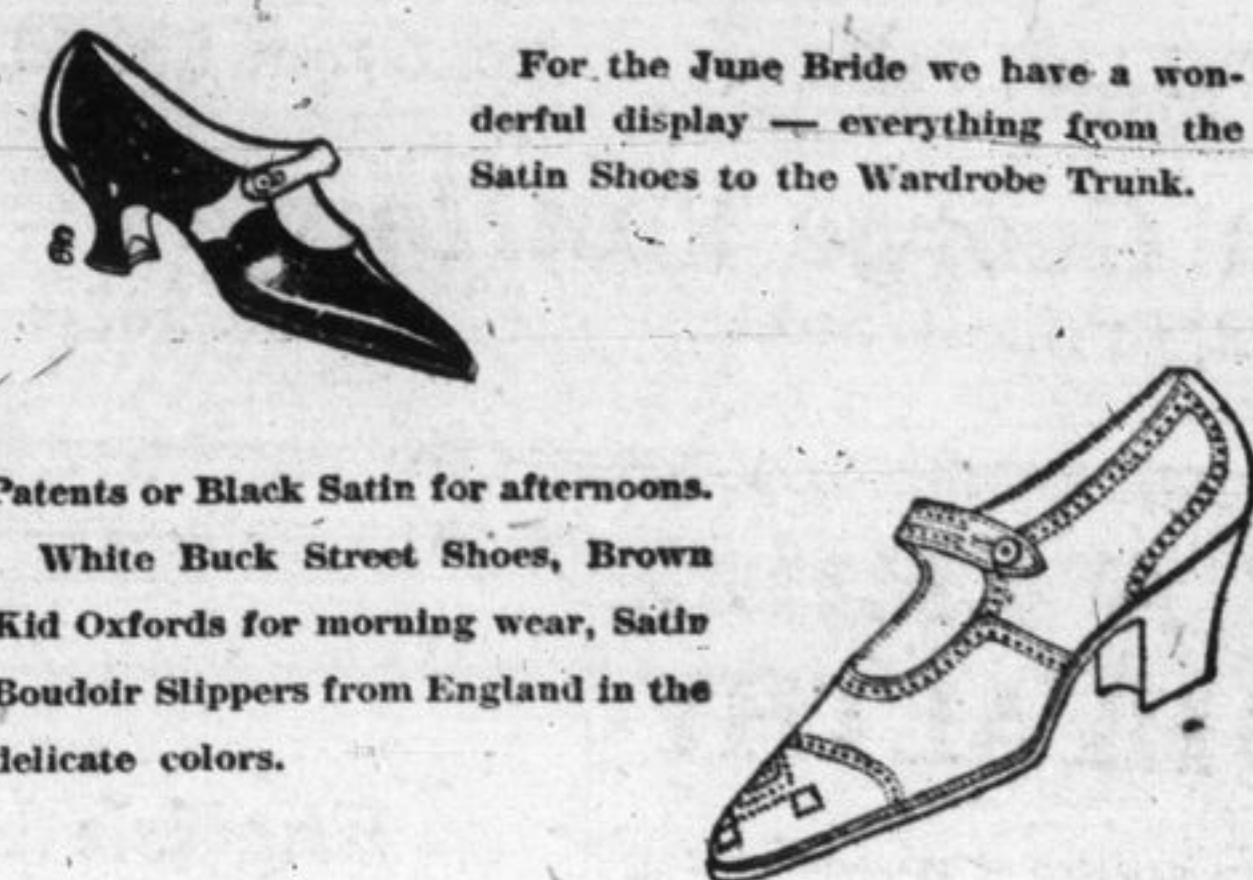
Every kitchen should have its first-aid shelf, on which should be bottles of peroxide, and witch hazel, ointment for burns and scalds, vaseline, a pair of scissors, cotton gauze and string. This shelf should be at some distance from the kitchen stove.

When colored garments have been made at home and the family laundry is given out, include in your washing a large-sized scrap of the new material from which the garments were made. If the scraps hold their colors well, the garments may then be sent to the laundry; if the samples come back faded, the garment should be washed at home with special care.

Discourage the youngster who wants to read "just a little while" in bed in order to become sleepy. Reading in bed overtaxes eyes that have already done a day's work.

To protect the wall back of the sink, and kitchen table and gas range, cut a sheet of heavy building paper into desired size and give it two coats of house paint. Use a color to match the woodwork or one that will harmonize with the tone of the wall and the paint must be thick.

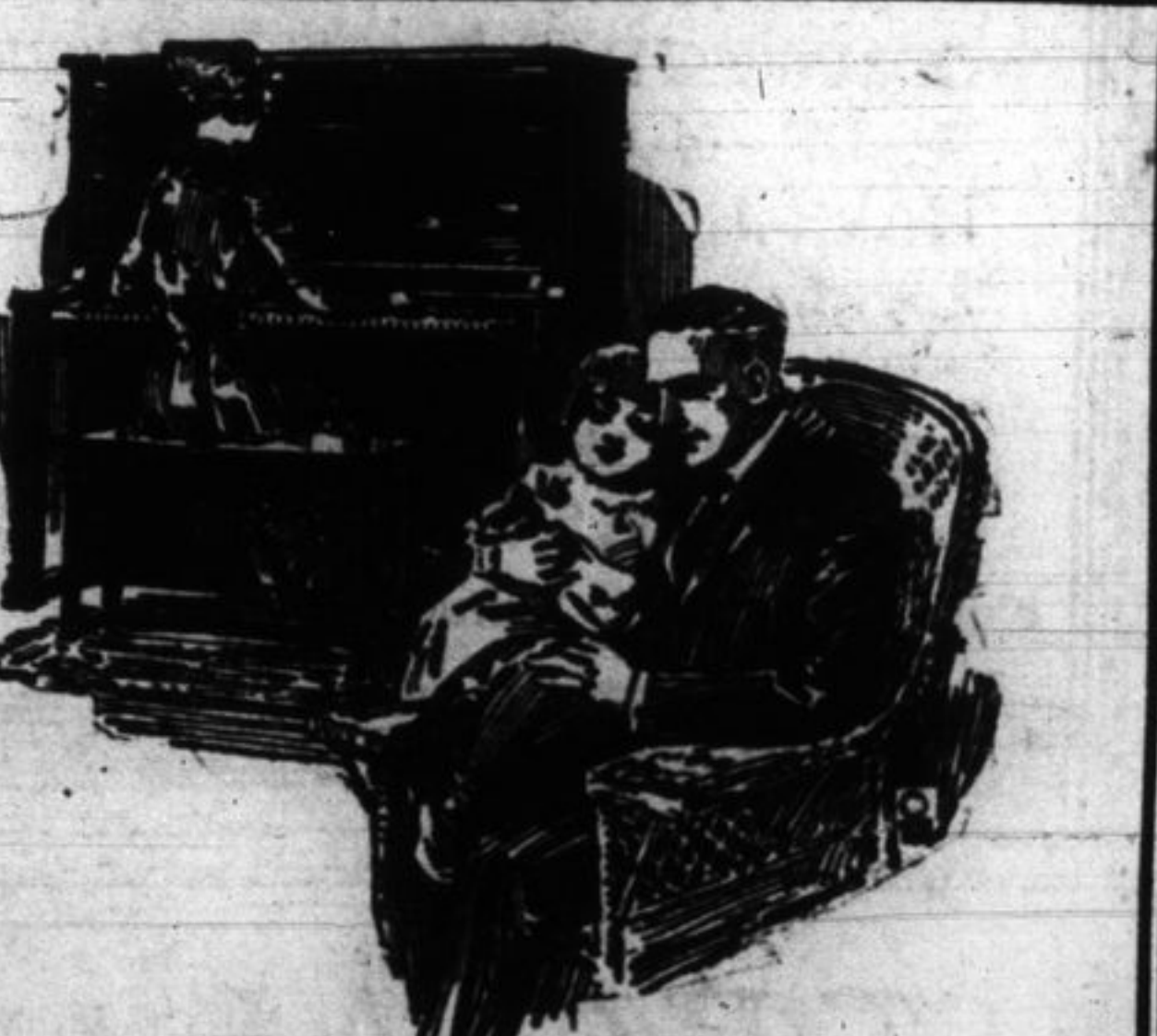
