### WATER IS VERY LOW IN THE ST. LAWRENCE

Fully 18 Inches Lower Than Usual at Season—Have to Alter Landings.

Watertown, N. Y., Times. The water in the St. Lawrence River is lower at this season of the year than it has been at the corresponding time in several years. Capt. E. S. Keeler, of Alexandria Bay, one of the best known and one of the most efficient of the older steamboat men on the river, says that the height of the water varies during each year, but that for a period of seven years it will gradually fall, and for the next seven years it will rise again by degrees. This year is the period of the lowest water. Next year's average will be slightly higher and so on until the seven years have passed, he says.

"In the yearly changes of the height of water in the St. Lawrence the lowest point is in January," says Captain Keeler. "About the first of February it commences to rise and continues until July 1st to 15th. This year the water is at a lower point than it has been for some time. It is at the present time fully eighteen inches lower than is usual at this season of the year. The raise since February has been only four inches. It is easier to navigate the St. Lawrence now, because so many shoals are above water and in sight. But the low water has brought other rocks nearer the surface than they are in high water, so the novice should still be careful.

"Many of the landing places on the river have had to be lowered as to get easy access to boats and at some of the islands there is so little water at the docks that the larger boats have not been put in commission yet. However, it is expected the next few weeks will see a decided change. The same situation prevails at Clayton and pilots on the St. Lawrence at that point are compelled to keep a close watch on the channels.

### BATSTONE SELECTED AS TEAM'S MANAGER

The Resignation of Joe Daley is Accepted With Much Regret.

At last night's meeting of the Kingston Amateur Baseball Association the chief business transacted was the appointment of Harry Batstone to the post of playing manager. The move was expected by those who had known that Joe Daley was about to withdraw but was only decided after considerable discussion. General regret is felt that Joe Daley is severing his connection with the team for which he has done so much. The present C. O. B. L. team is constructed on the foundation of the old Ponies team, which started out as a junior organization and went on into senior city baseball and later played independently here in exhibition games and Joe Daley has been the leading factor in building it up and keeping it together.

His resignation comes as the result of his not holding an amateur card and although he could secure one without a great deal of trouble, Joe is contented to step out and let some person else take over the reins of control. It is an opportunity for which he has been waiting as he has desired all along to join the ranks of the spectators. Final arrangements for the Belleville trip today were made and the team was notified of the necessity of choosing a captain now that Batstone has been promoted. No decision has yet been reached but the name of Jack Evans has been mentioned in this connection. Other matters of immediate interest to the club were decided upon.

Defeated Pittserry. The Kingston Business College baseball team paid a visit to Pittserry recently and defeated the team there by 15 to 8, after a hard fought battle. One of the features of the game was a home run by McCullough of the Kingstonians. A return engagement will be played at the cricket field early Thursday afternoon.

A Very Unfair Story. There is a malicious story going the rounds in Kingston township to the effect that A. M.
