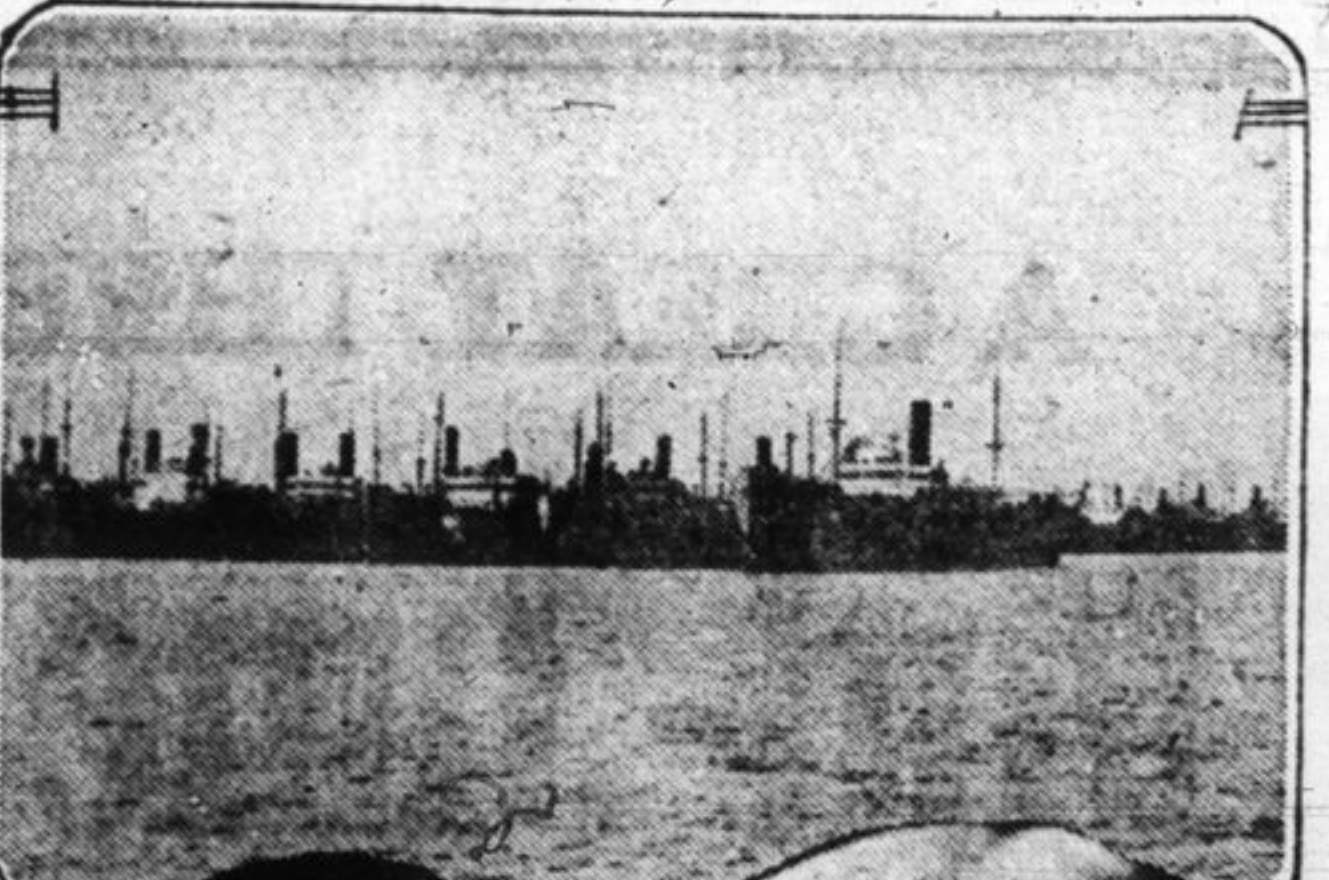

Ford's Hand Seen In Billion-Dollar Offer For Merchant Marine?

Silver Creek, N.Y., June 12.—The unexplained presence here of Henry Ford, last week, has given rise to the belief that the offer of John W. Slack, president of the Columbia Postal Supply Company of \$1,051,000,000 to the U. S. Shipping Board for the entire merchant fleet was made on behalf of Mr. Ford.

Mr. Slack, whose headquarters is in Silver Creek, admitted that Ford was in town last week, but refused to admit that he had talked with Ford, or to explain what the automobile manufacturer's business there was.

Slack's offer was generally conceded to have been made on behalf of other interests, and Ford's little visit practically confirms this belief.

The manner in which his billion-dollar bid was received by Chairman of the Shipping Board Lasker piqued Mr. Slack, who intimated that other bids received by the board appeared to be the subject of private or secret negotiations while his own was open to the public.

Ford's offer to buy the ships discarded after the disarmament conference created even more discussion than his interest in the Muscle Shoals project, which he was prevented from acquiring by congress.

If Ford's offer for the merchant fleet be accepted, and his campaign for the presidency should succeed, the Michigan millionaire would then present the unusual spectacle of a president owning his own merchant marine.
