A By-law to ratify and confirm an agreement with William Collie, of the City of Kingston, in the County of Frontenac, Manufacturer, and to authorize the issue of debentures of this Corporation to the amount of \$7,500.00.

The City of Kingston and William Collie, of Collie's Limited, have entered into the agreement set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, and the Woollen Mill now operated by the said William Collie is a manufacturing industry within the meaning of the Municipal Act.

The Council of the Corporation of the City of Kingston submits and Bylaw to the electors to authorize the issue of debentures to the amount of \$7,500.00 for the purpose of granting aid by way of bonus for the promotion of manufactures to aid in the equipment and extension and operation of said woollen mills.

The amount of debt to be created \$7,500.00, payable in 20 annual payments, the amount to be raised annually will be \$375.00 for the payment of the interest thereon, and \$252.00 to form a sinking fund for the payment of the said debt, making the annual amount \$627.00.

This By-law shall come in force and take effect on receiving the assent of the electors and having a third reading by the City Council. SCHEDULE

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to grant the said application of the said party of the first part, but subject to terms, conditions and provisos nerein contained: THIS INDENTURE WIT-

NESSETH that the said parties hereto hereby covenant, promise and agree each with the other of them as 1. The party of the first part shall operate and carry on his present busi-

ness of manufacturing cloths for the period of twenty years to be com-puted from the 1st day of January, 1923, and so that in each year during the said period of twenty years at least \$40,000.00 shall be disbursed as wages to workmen in the employ and about the said business, exclusive of the salaries paid to the party of the first part or any other person or persons that shall be admitted to the firm of Collie's Limited, or any other firm that may carry on said business in succession or substitution for the said firm as partners or otherwise.

2. The Corporation shall, by its Council as soon as may be procure to be submitted to the Electors of the Municipality of the City of Kingston under the provisions of the Municipal Act in that behalf, a By-law authorizing the issue of the debentures of the Corporation to raise the said sum

3. In case the said By-law upon such submission receives the assent of the said electors as by law required, the Corporation shall by its Council pass the said By-law and shall pay the said bonus of \$7,500.00 to the said party of the first part upon being satisfied that the factory now owned and operated by the said party of the first part has been fully equipped for the manufacture of his oducts by the said party of the first part, and is in actual operation and as in its permanent and continuous employ such a sufficient number of amount hereinbefore set out as wages

4. The factory and premises of the party of the first part shall be exschool taxes and rates) from the first of January, 1924, during the said period of ten years or such portion of said period as the party of the first part shall well and truly observe and perform the stipulations, provisos and conditions herein on their part con-tained and the said exemption shall extend and apply to the business assessment in respect of the said factory and premises as well as to the realty assessment


