THE GENERAL SESSIONS

Opened Before Judge Madden —Five Criminal Cases On Docket.

The June sessions of the Peace opened on Tuesday afternoon, at 2 o'clock, before Judge Madden, but the entire afternoon was given over to the consideration by the grand jury of the criminal cases to come before the court. The grand jury was in session until 7 p.m. when it was announced that their report would be submitted to the court on Wednesday morning. There was quite a large attendance at the opening of the court.

The grand jury is composed of the following: James Greenlee, Joyceville (foreman), George Bishop, Barrie; Monty Fawcett, Wolfe Island; Craig Hawkey, Kingston, R.R. No. 2; Arnold McGinnis, Oso; Charles O'Connor, Sydenham; Robert Smith, Kingston township; Karl Vanluven, Battersea; John Woodruff, Cataract; Herbert Murray, Barriefield; Alexander Atkins, Portsmouth; Matthew Shannon, Kingston township; Thomas Cashman, Glenburnie.

In his address to the grand jury, Judge Madden referred to the cases in the docket. The list of prisoners contained the name of one person who was confined in the jail, awaiting trial. However, there were four out on bail. The conditions on the whole were about the same as at the last session of this court, while the alleged offenses were also similar. Two cases were of a very serious nature.

The list of offenses charged included the performing of an illegal operation, theft of chickens, theft of money, and furious driving in the highway, causing damage and endangering life.

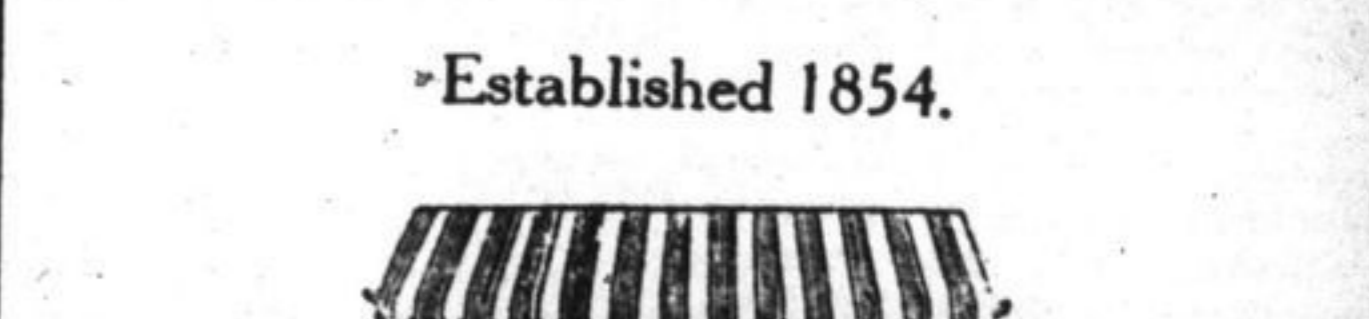
