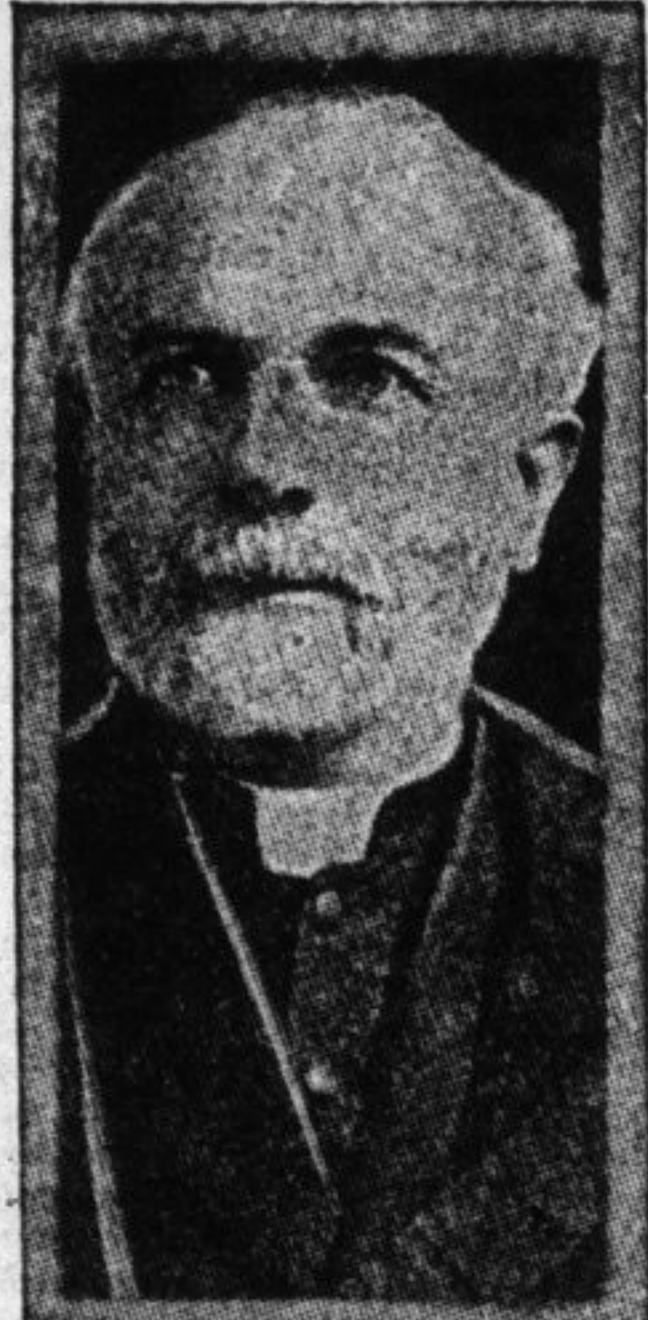

MISS HEDMAN'S CAREER

From the Toronto Star. Few theatrical careers have been so sensationally successful as that of Miss Martha Hedman, who is a sister of Professor Thure Hedman, of Toronto University, formerly of Queen's, and who was introduced to the American stage by the late Charles Frohman.

Miss Hedman is spending the summer with Professor and Mrs. Hedman, having taken two months' leave of absence from the stage. And when she takes a holiday from the stage, she makes the severance complete. In private life she isn't an actress—not even an actress on a holiday. She is simple, friendly and direct, and without a trace of self-consciousness. She speaks English with a very faint European accent which one detects at long intervals and with distinct pleasure.

Fortune came to the young Swedish actress with both hands open. It brought her, in the first place, beauty. She has a lovely sensitive face and the vivid blonde coloring which is her Scandinavian birthright. It also brought her a fine balance of emotion and intelligence. And it gave her finally the thing which has perhaps done more than anything else to show her career, a restless and never-being satisfied desire to make things happen.

"As long as things happen—good or bad, I don't care which—I am happy."

Things began to happen very early in her career. She gained her first theatrical experience on the Swedish stage, but presently, in the face of much friendly warning she determined to acquire the English language and attempt the English stage. She worked hard at her English, and her fame must have travelled farther than she realized, for one day when she was in London she was summoned to appear before the great Charles Frohman.

She went, unbelongingly, to his office.

"How would you like to play a part in the English translation of 'The Attack' on the American stage?" Frohman inquired.

The young actress hesitated. She had had no experience on the American stage—her English—

"Take the boat across to Paris tonight and see the play and come back and tell me," said Frohman.

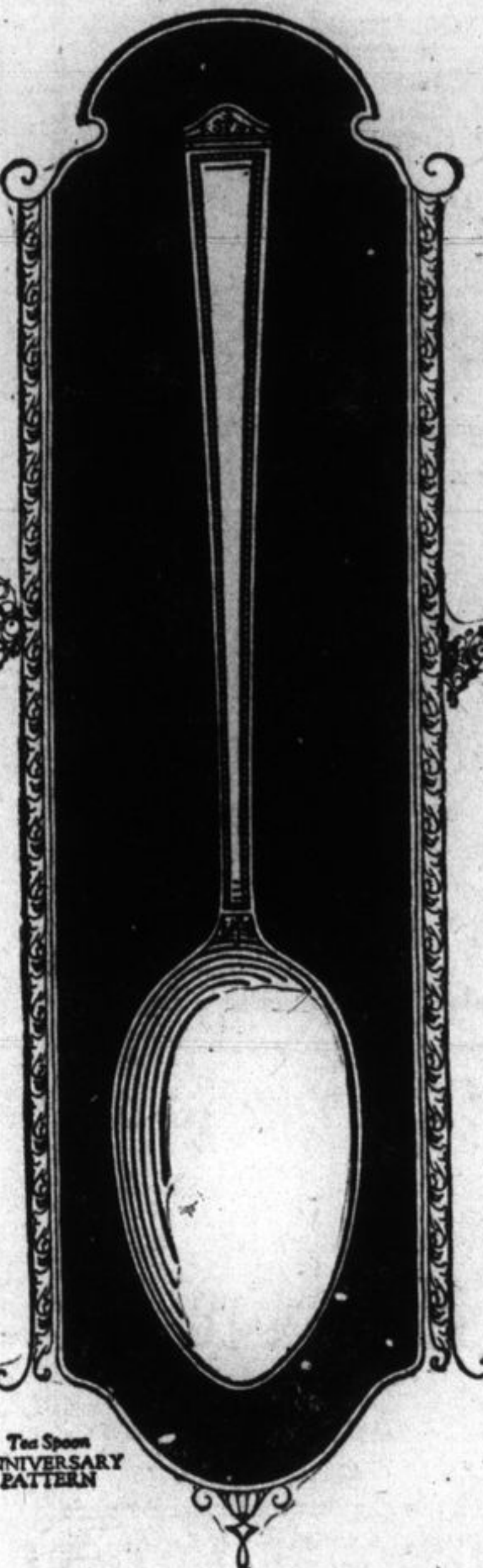
She went across that night, saw the play, and returned the following day.
