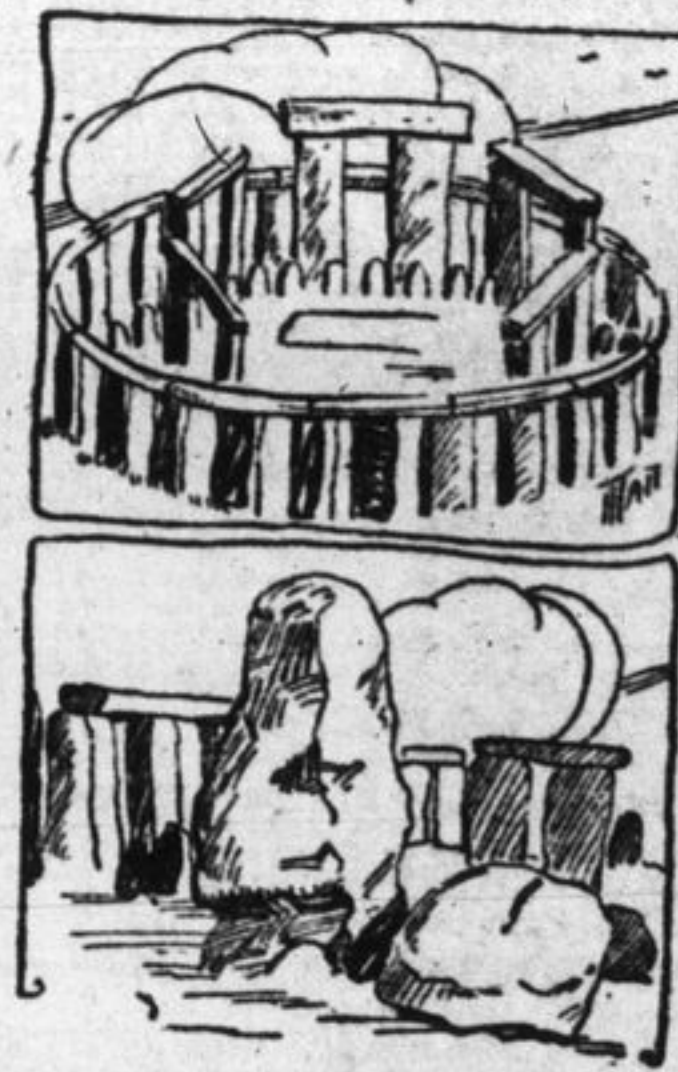
## CHILD'S STORY OF THE HUMAN RACE By Uncle Ray

Chapter 6—Huge Stone Circles. The lower half of to-day's picture shows some huge stones found at Stonehenge, England. These stones are believed to have been placed together by the same race of people as built huge tombs which were spread all over Europe.

It is uncertain just what sort of structure once existed at Stonehenge. Some of the stones have fallen over, or else have been interfered with by the people inhabiting the region during the past several thousand years. The stones may once have formed part of a circle or horseshoe in which early people in England gathered to pray to the sun.

In many other European countries, stones were placed together in much the same way as those at Stonehenge. A large number of the stones were as high as a two-story house.

Some stones weighed as much as 40 tons. That is a tremendous weight; but one stone weighing about 300 tons (600,000 pounds) was found in northern France. It was lying in three pieces, and seems to have been broken when it tumbled from an upright position. The manner in which such great stones could have been moved from place to place remains a mystery, but we shall attempt an explanation in our next chapter.

### ADDRESS OF W. F. NICKLE After Being Declared Elected By Acclamation For Riding of Kingston.

After W. F. Nickle had been declared elected by acclamation to the Ontario legislature Thursday afternoon in the city hall, Major W. J. McManus was invited to take the chair. The chairman then called upon Mr. Nickle, who gave a forty-minute address on the various issues uppermost in the present campaign, from a provincial as well as a local standpoint.

After thanking the members of the local Conservative party for their loyalty during the days preceding the nominations, Mr. Nickle went on to tell of his appreciation of the action of the Liberal party who had apparently not desired opposition in the present election for this riding. In the days of Sir John A. Macdonald, the two great parties had had some stirring fights, and the speaker assured his audience that if the Liberal party did some day decide to nominate a candidate in this city that one of the bonniest battles imaginable would be fought. Mr. Nickle asserted that there were many men of outstanding ability, great courage and undying enthusiasm in the Liberal party, and that this great party would once more come into its own.

Continuing, Mr. Nickle spoke of the issues in the present campaign, and of the confusion that had been apparent to him during his tour of the province. In some districts the Hydro was the important question, while in other sections of Ontario, there appeared to be more interest shown in the O.T.A. enforcement. The real issue is in the fact that the electors have become tired of a class-conscious government and desire to be governed by a party representative of all classes.

A brief review of the past eighteen months, during which the speaker had represented Kingston, was also given, a reference being made to the betterment of conditions for Queen's university. The minister of education had been very fair to our university. The speaker also expressed his appreciation of the support given by Ex-Mayor Corbett, the county council and others who had assisted in pressing the government to rebuild the dairy school in this city. Other questions were also reviewed by Mr. Nickle, who touched briefly on the bonus controversy, the financial criticism of the recent budget, the expenditure on government highways, and the large deficit by the people of Ontario.

### McGlashan-Rogers Wedding

The wedding took place on Tuesday, June 12th, in St. James Anglican chapel, when Elizabeth, elder daughter of Mrs. H. Rogers, Johnson street, was united to Arthur Edward McGlashan, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. D. J. McGlashan, Belleville. The ceremony was performed by Rev. T. W. Savary. The bride was becomingly attired in Alice blue alltime crepe and Paisley and feathered hat. She carried a shower bouquet of Ophelia roses and lilies-of-the-valley. She wore a black fox fur, the gift of the groom. The bridesmaid, Miss Wills Rogers, sister of the bride, was attired in navy duchess silk and lace and carried a bouquet of American beauty roses. The groom was supported by his brother, Alexander McGlashan. After the ceremony a buffet luncheon was served at the home of the bride. The happy couple left for eastern points amid showers of confetti and the good wishes of their friends.

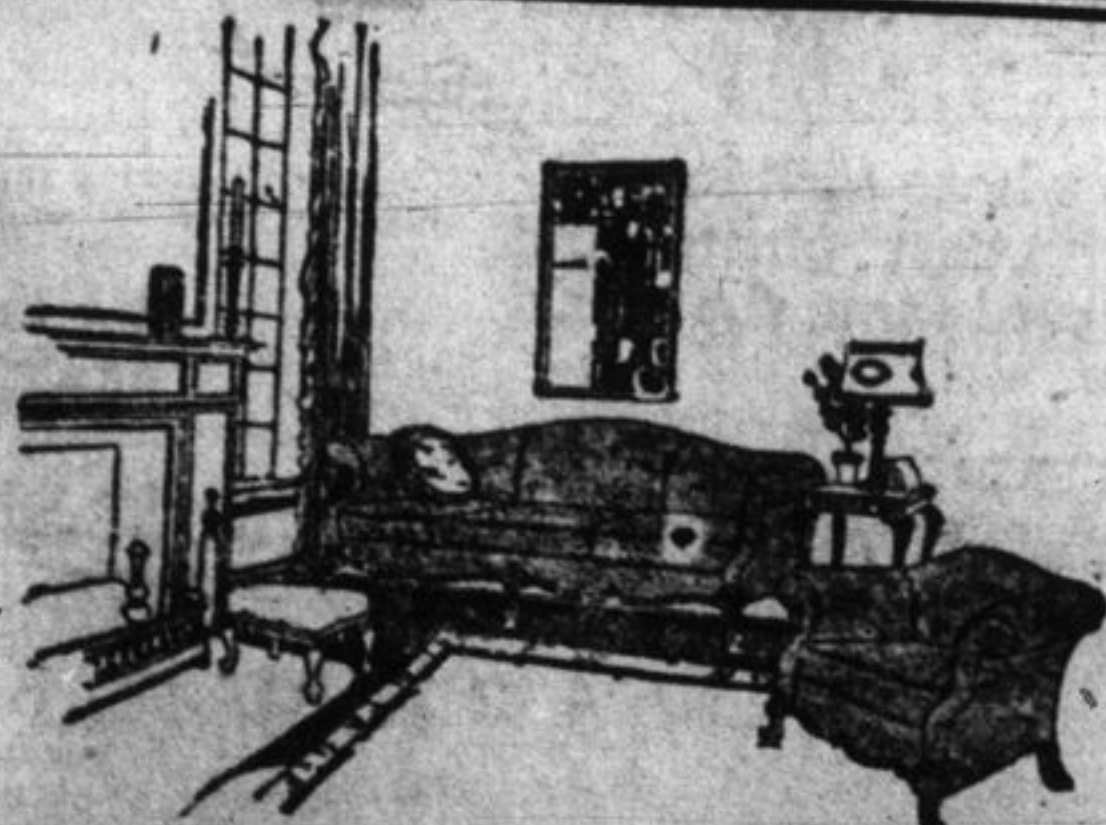
