WANTS YOUTH TAUGHT LAWS OF THE COUNTRY

Suggestion of Grand Jury to Lessen the Crimes That Are Committed.

The grand jury in its report at the Court of General Sessions expressed great satisfaction over the conditions found in the public institutions inspected. They were: the county jail, General Hospital, Hotel Dieu, Infants' Home, Orphan's Home, St. Mary's-on-the-Lake, Rockwood hospital, and Portsmouth penitentiary.

The report expressed abhorrence of the tragedy enacted by Leo Rogers, and referring to the abnormal increase in crime, recommended that a text book on civics for use in the public schools in order that the young might receive adequate instructions in the fundamental laws of the country, be published. It says: "The appalling increase in serious crimes committed by young men during the past three years, particularly, and the enormous increase in the population of the Portsmouth penitentiary, are matters for grave concern, and present a problem for serious study on the part of both the provincial and federal authorities, but the root of the matter lies within the province itself. While economic and social conditions are admittedly determining factors, often it would be futile to ignore the importance of education designed to provide the foundation of moral ideas and fundamental principles that offer sure resistance to criminal tendencies. Does our system of education take sufficient cognizance of this?"

"Our system of education is lacking in a text book on civics that should treat in a direct manner with the subjects of moral and civil law. Too much that is valuable is left to inference merely and only clearly discerned after the rude shock of transgression. Such a text book should treat simply and briefly with inviolability of life and property rights; employer and employed; sacredness of contracts; fidelity to trust; the relation of the individual to the municipality and to the state; the function of the state and the fundamental laws—all subjects of supreme importance and capable of being grasped by the high school child.

very foundations of the existing system of government, property rights, and our economic and financial systems, to say nothing of religion itself, have been menaced by imported propaganda, and nobody knows how far or in what manner it has permeated the entire social structure. Only by abnormal symptoms can we appreciate its presence and effects; and we should take warning in time and give the rising generations direct and definite instruction on the foundation principles of British citizenship."

Judge Madden's Remarks.
In receiving the report, Judge Madden commended the members of the jury for their interest in the institutions receiving government support, stating that the people were entitled to know how the money was being expended.

Judge Madden also referred to the case of Leo Rogers, and stated that he had yet to hear how Rogers was allowed out on parole. He said that Rogers did not get out of the penitentiary on his recommendation, but on his recommendation, his Honor also referred to the fact that he had sentenced Rogers at the time he was charged with committing a brutal assault on Detective Duncan.
