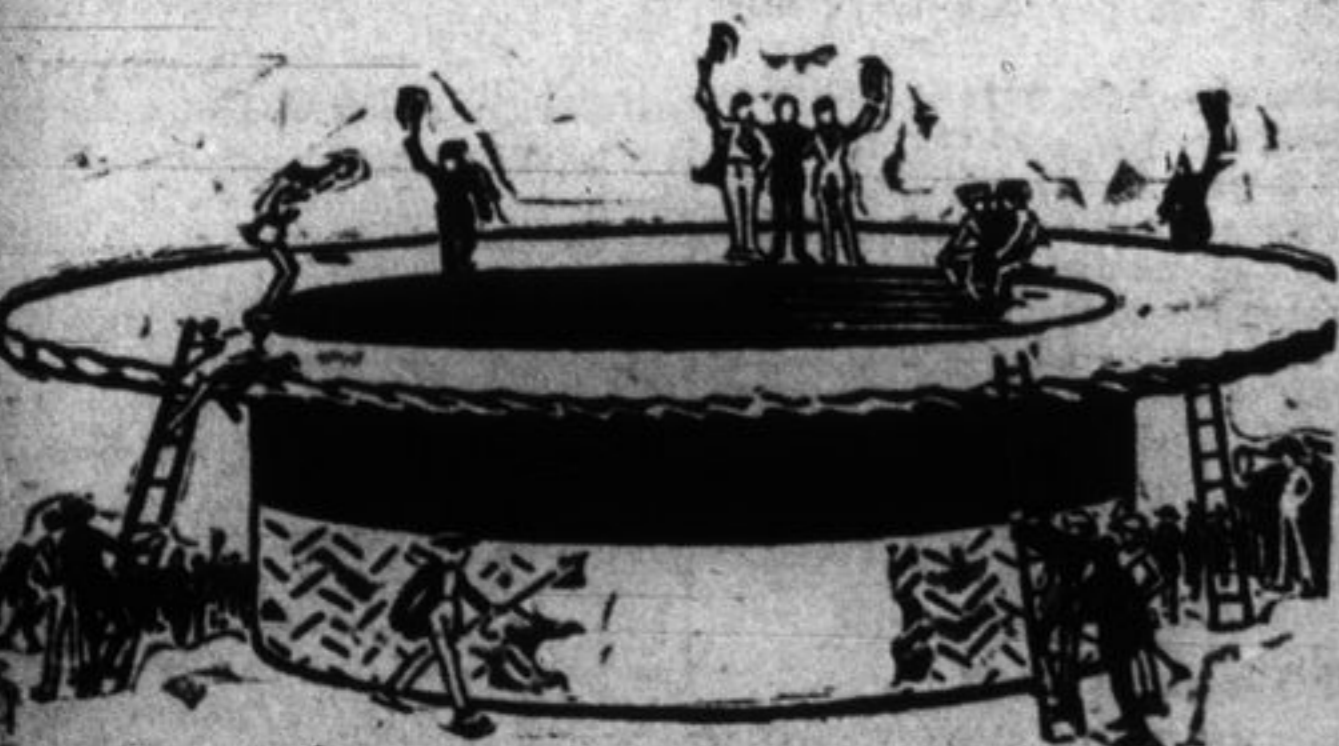

Prizes. Sword of honor for conduct and discipline—B.S.M. H. A. Richardson.

His Excellency the Governor-General's gold medals—Gold medal (for the cadet obtaining the highest aggregate of marks throughout his course), H. A. Richardson.

Silver medal (for the cadet obtaining the second highest aggregate of marks throughout his course), C.Q.M.S. R. G. Rudolf.

Bronze medal (for the cadet obtaining the third highest aggregate of marks throughout his course), C.Q.M.S. J. E. L. James.

The W. M. Carleton Monk memorial scholarship (instituted in memory of the late Capt. W. M. C. Monk, an ex-cadet of this college, by his mother). Note—This scholarship is for the purpose of giving assistance at any Canadian University to the cadet who obtains the highest aggregate of marks in academic subjects during his last year. Lance-Sergt. E. H. Barclay.

The Vander Smitsen Award—Company Sergt.-Major E. W. T. Gill. (Instituted in memory of the late Capt. Victor Vander Smitsen and his comrades of the R.M.C. graduating class of 1914 who gave their lives in the great war.) The award is won by the cadet who is selected by a special committee (guided by the votes of all the cadets in the college), who, by his personality and his efforts throughout the entire course, is considered the most worthy recipient, the battalion sergeant-major being excluded.

The Edith Boulton Nordheimer memorial prize—Instituted by the I.O.D.E. in memory of the late Mrs. Samuel Nordheimer, whose son, Capt. S. P. R. B. Nordheimer, was a cadet at this college. For the best essay on imperial history, subject to be selected by the commandant, written by a cadet of the 1st class. Subject for 1927-1928, "The History of Kingston." Awarded to B.S.M. H. A. Richardson.

The Alliance Francaise medal (given by the Societe Alliance Francaise, for the cadet who has made the most progress in French throughout his entire course)—Sergt. R. E. A. Morton.

First Class Prizes. General proficiency, the largest aggregate of marks in last year—B.S.M. H. A. Richardson.

The following, won by cadets who have made the highest aggregate marks in each subject throughout the entire course:

General proficiency in military subjects—C.Q.M.S. R. G. Rudolf. Military engineering—C.Q.M.S. J. E. L. James.

Tactics—C.Q.M.S. R. G. Rudolf. Artillery—C.Q.M.S. R. G. Rudolf. Handed to C.S.M. G. E. R. Smith, in accordance with R.M.C. regulations, which provide that no cadet shall be the recipient of more than two class prizes, other than medals, in any one year.

Physics and chemistry—C.Q.M.S., J. E. L. James.

Civil engineering and survey—Won by C.Q.M.S. J. E. L. James. Handed to No. 1534, C.S.M. R. E. H. Oglvie, in accordance with R.M.C. regulations which provide that no cadet shall be the recipient of more than two class prizes, other than medals, in any one year.

Drills, exercises and practical work—B.S.M. H. A. Richardson.

Canadian Artillery Association prize, \$25, awarded the cadet who obtained the highest number of marks in theoretical and practical work during the last year—C.Q.M.S. R. G. Rudolf.

Second Class. General proficiency throughout the year—Lance-Corpl. H. F. Gandy. The Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario silver medal, awarded to the cadet who obtains the highest aggregate of marks since joining the college, on completing the work of the second class—Lance-Corpl. H. F. Gandy.

Class prizes, second class, won by cadets obtaining the highest aggregate of marks in each subject since joining the college:

Other Prizes. Large Bezzell cup (awarded to the three cadets obtaining the highest marks in the several branches of training)—B.S.M. H. A. Richardson. C.S.M. R. E. H. Oglvie, C.S.M. E. W. T. Gill.

Small Bezzell cup (awarded to

the best company in general efficiency)—"B" Company.

Bezzell inter-platoon cup (based on the marks obtained by each cadet in the platoon in drills and exercises, together with marks reduced, obtained by platoons as a whole in the annual drill competition and trek)—No. 1 (Jones) platoon.

Borden shield (revolver)—Corpl. W. R. Sawyer. Ontario Artillery Association cup (Awarded to the cadet with the highest marks in artillery)—C.S.M. C. E. F. Jones.

The Closing Events. The programme was varied and exceptionally interesting to the numerous visitors, who defied the heat and flocked to the Point Frederick grounds for the exhibition of training in several of the arms of the service. The display and inspections included manoeuvres by the R. M. C. cavalry squadron, an exhibition of physical training and gymnastics, demonstration of engineering and demolitions, and the inspection of the cadet battalion on the parade square.

His Excellency Lord Byng of Vimy, Governor-General of Canada,

Lady Byng and the Hon. E. O. Macdonald, minister of national defence, arrived at the college shortly after 10 o'clock, where they were received by a mounted escort from the cavalry squadron. The distinguished visitors proceeded to Fort Frederick where a clever exhibition of physical training and Swedish drill was rendered by the cadets. An inspection was then made of the old Martello tower on the point, which was recently renovated and is now the college museum.

The cavalry squadron gave a very pleasing display of their intricate drill on the south end of the football field, and this fine exhibition of horsemanship and training provoked a great deal of applause from the spectators. After a general inspection had been made of the college buildings, a spectacular demonstration of the use of high explosives in warfare was given along the waterfront facing Fort Henry.

The cadet battalion was then reviewed on the parade square by His Excellency the governor-general and the minister of national defence, the cadets making their usual striking and smart appearance on parade as has been their traditional custom, since the college was founded. The morning events were brought to a conclusion with the annual presentation of prizes and diplomas by His Excellency in the Sir Arthur Currie Hall.

CADETS OF THE R.M.C. PARADE TO ST. GEORGE'S

The Sermon Was Preached by the Rev. Dr. Orchard, Port Hope.

The gentlemen cadets of the Royal Military College paraded to St. George's Cathedral on Sunday morning with the R. C. R. life and drum band in attendance, for the annual service which is the opening event of the closing exercises. Red and white flowers, given by the cadets, were in the vases on the

high altar, decked the pulpit and were massed on the chancel steps. The Dean of Ontario was celebrant at the choral eucharist, at which more than one hundred cadets and ex-cadets made their corporate communion. Eyre's office for the Holy Communion was used, and the anthem was splendidly sung. The cadets, who chose the hymns for the day, sang lustily and kept the time honored custom of giving their offertory in coppers.

Rev. F. G. Orchard, D.D. Principal of Trinity College school, Port Hope, preached the sermon, choosing as his text, the words of St. John the Divine, "To him that overcometh, I will give a white stone, and in the stone a new name written, which no man knoweth, saving he that receiveth it." The gladiator, who fought and won the fearful battle with the starving beasts unloosed in the Roman arena, received the white stone, on the story of his victory, and his new name as a free man. "We have seen," said the speaker, "during the recent years, many of our comrades caught up to meet the Great Captain and from Him, who alone knew their struggles, failures, and success they undoubtedly received the white stone of him that overcometh."

"The four years of your college life is ended, and you go out into the world to make good the principles of your motto, Truth, Duty and Valor. That you have realized the truth of the words of the collect of the day, 'O God, without whom nothing is strong,' is shown by your request that your last act of worship should be the Holy Communion, in which, please God, you will receive strength to fight the battle against the world, the flesh and the devil. The glory of a young man is his strength, and the challenge comes to you to use your strength for your country and your God."

Dr. Orchard referred to the news just received of the death of a distinguished ex-cadet, Robert Gilmore Edward Leckie, who was seriously wounded in 1916. His public and private life were in accord

with the traditions of the Royal Military College he loved so well. After the service the commandant and staff took the salute at Clarence street, as the cadets, led by the band, marched past, watched by an admiring crowd, which included many visitors in town.

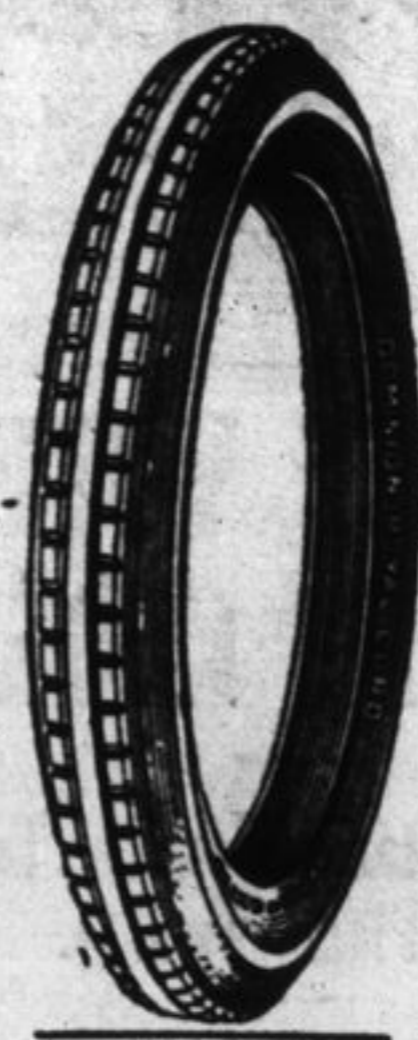
