LATE EX-WARDEN CAMPBELL.
Funeral Held On Friday Was Very Largely Attended.

On Friday afternoon, the funeral of the late ex-warden John E. Campbell, Verona, took place and was largely attended. The Masonic order had charge of the funeral, and the Oddfellows also attended. The funeral took place to the Methodist church, at Verona and interment at Pleadilly. Rev. A. W. Stewart, Aultsville, and Rev. Dr. James Lawson, Verona, officiated. Many beautiful floral offerings were received. The pall-bearers were: F. R. Leslie, G. S. Godfrey, C. G. McKnight, Richard Judge, Joseph Wilkins and Thomas Watson. The late Mr. Campbell was born in Batterses, on June 2nd 1855. He entered municipal life in 1888, as councillor in the township of Hinchinbrooke, and was elected reeve from 1887 to 1897; county commissioner 1899 to 1902; warden of the county of Frontenac in 1901. He was very prominent in Orange lodge circles. He joined Albion Lodge, No. 109, A. F. and A. M., Harrowsmith, in 1888. Mayflower Lodge, No. 297,

Van Camp, Watertown, N.Y.; Mrs. Eleanor Peters, Syracuse, N.Y.
The late Mr. Campbell came of loyal British stock. His grandfather fought against the United States in the war of 1812 and his father, an Englishman, fought in the rebellion of 1837. He moved to Hinchinbrooke township in 1875 and resided there until 1918 when he retired and moved to Verona.
