## VIOLATED "PEN" RULES FINED IN POLICE COURT

Strawberries 15c a box Wednesday War Record Was Help to C. R. Hart in Time of Trouble.

> In the police court on Tuesday morning, C. R. Hart, charged with carrying an article from the Portsmouth penitentiary for a convict, was fined \$25 and costs or one month in jail. He pleaded guilty to the charge. A. B. Cunningham appeared on his behalf, and informed the magistrate that Hart had a splendid war record and asked that he be allowed to go on suspended sentence. His worship stated that he could not allow the accused to go on suspended sentence. but that in the sentence he would impose he would give consideration for the war record of the accused.

Hart was one of the originals to go overseas. He was wounded on three occasions and was awarded a military medal.

Mr. Cunningham pointed out that while Hart had pleaded guilty to the charge, it could not be registered as a crime, and in view of the fact that the accused had a wife and two children he saked that leniency be shown Magistrate Farrell, in imposing entence, stated that the case was not a pleasant one for him to deal with, especially in view of the splen did war record Hart had to his credk. However, he would take this service into consideration and disposed of the case by imposing a fine of \$25 and costs, with the option of one month in jail.

Although nothing was said in court a to the article Hart carried out from the "pen," for a convict, it is understood that it was a letter.
