THE CANADIAN POSTAL CLERKS' IN SESSION

Will Mix Business With Pleasure During Their Convention in Kingston.

The eleventh annual convention of the Dominion Postal Clerks' Association opened in the division courtroom of the county buildings on Monday afternoon, forty delegates being present from all sections of the Dominion, from the Atlantic to the Pacific. President R. S. Bartlett presided during the afternoon session, which was taken up entirely by routine business and included the appointment of various committees to handle the work of the convention. James Kane, of the local post office staff, is chairman of the entertainment committee, and a splendid programme has been arranged to prove that Kingston is replete with every variety of amusement, and that the Limestone City "posties" are socially to none in the matter of hospitality.

The entertainment opened on Monday morning when the delegates paid a visit to the Royal Military College and witnessed the various closing exercises of diploma day. They were shown the various college buildings and points of interest around Point Frederick by Capt. F. Vokes, and the convention members expressed profound approval of the splendid facilities in the historic military institution as well as delight with the training and deportment shown by the cadets on and off parade.

Upon returning from the R.M.C. a banquet was held in the British-American hotel, where a civic welcome was extended to the visitors by Mayor Angrove, and a number of appropriate addresses were delivered by various speakers. President R. S. Bartlett, Past President Arthur Craghton, now editor of the Postal Clerks' Journal, Postmaster James Stewart and P. Menard, Montreal, a vice-president of the association, all spoke briefly along convention lines, the visitors expressing their hearty appreciation of the hospitality shown by the local staff members, and assuring their hosts that one and all would enjoy the convention in every way possible.

During the coming sessions of the convention, two of the most important measures that will be discussed are the questions of revision of salary schedules and superannuation funds. It is expected that a delegation will be appointed to wait upon the post-office department, when the convention has reached a decision in these matters.

The members of the local entertainment committee desire to express their appreciation of the kindness of the Imperial Tobacco Company, Mr. O'Brien, the local manager, having donated cigars and cigarettes for the use of the delegates on the boat trip on Wednesday afternoon. The Oberdorfer cigar company also donated a quantity of their choice cigars to the convention during their visit to the R. M. C.

The Tuesday morning session of the Dominion Postal Clerks' Association opened at 10 o'clock, the appointment of committees being the main item on the programme. It is expected that the various convenors will report back to the convention by Tuesday afternoon, on various matters effecting the welfare of the members of the association.

The discussion of the salary schedules took up a great deal of time during the morning, but no conclusion was reached, and it is under-

stood that the matter will be further investigated this afternoon. Increased grants for superannuation will also be suggested and many additional benefits are hoped for in the near future.

IN MARINE CIRCLES

The large Rickerton, owned by John E. Russell, Toronto, in tow of the tug Thompson, collided with the steamer Corunna, owned by the Dominion Coal Company, in the Soulanges Canal, near Montreal, on Sunday last, considerable damage being done to both vessels. The Corunna suffered damage to the extent of \$10,000, and the Rickerton is also badly smashed. A good deal of sympathy for Mr. Russell is felt by local marine men, as it is believed that the Toronto ship-owner had no insurance on this vessel.

Capt. John Donnelly, of the Donnelly Salvage and Wrecking Company, has purchased the steel barge Cobourg, from the Canada Steamship Lines, as an extra lighter in the salvage work of his company. The Cobourg has a capacity of 45,000 bushels of wheat, and the vessel will be a splendid addition to the Donnelly fleet operating on the St. Lawrence and lakes. The vessel will be made over considerable for the new work to be undertaken.

The steamer Canadian Engineer passed down on Monday night, from Detroit to Montreal with freight.

The schooner Mary A. Daryaw cleared on Tuesday for Oswego to load coal for Kingston.

The steamer Mapleboro arrived from the canal on Monday night and cleared with freight for Montreal.

CAR GOES OVER BANK

Two Former Kingstonians Had a Miraculous Escape.

Narrow escape from serious injury was experienced by Miss W. M. Kirkpatrick and W. S. Kirkpatrick, daughter and son of Dr. S. F. Kirkpatrick, 263 Clemow avenue, when a large Studebaker automobile, the property of Robert Gill, of this city, which they were driving, plunged over a steep embankment on the Prescott Highway a short distance south of Hog's Back, says the Ottawa Journal.

At the point where the car went over there is a drop of almost twenty-five feet, and the escape of the two occupants is regarded as miraculous. The car was slightly damaged. Mr. Kirkpatrick was driving and was taking the car to Kingston for Mr. Gill at the time.

What Wolfe Island Did

Wolfe Island gave G. A. B. Clerk a good majority and Dr. Spankie's friends planned a reception for him as the results were a tribute to his work. He was expected to reach the island in the evening, and a committee had a whelbarrow in which they proposed to convey him from the wharf to the township hall. Dr. Spankie did not arrive, however, so James McGlynn was placed in it as a substitute and given the ride in honor of the victory for Mr. Clark on the island. The results from the other townships were very disappointing to the islanders.

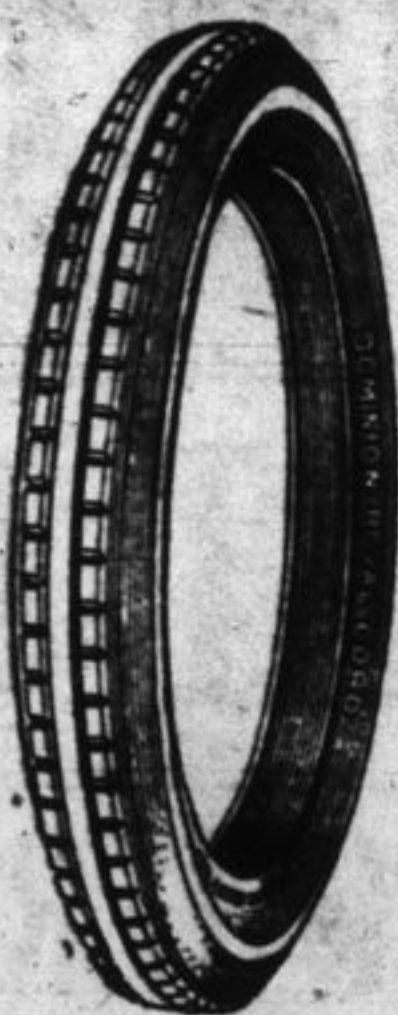

VIOLATED "PEN" RULES FINED IN POLICE COURT

War Record Was Help to C. R. Hart in Time of Trouble.

In the police court on Tuesday morning, C. R. Hart, charged with carrying an article from the Portsmouth penitentiary for a convict, was fined \$25 and costs or one month in jail. He pleaded guilty to the charge. A. B. Cunningham appeared on his behalf, and informed the magistrate that Hart had a splendid war record and asked that he be allowed to go on suspended sentence. His worship stated that he could not allow the accused to go on suspended sentence, but that in the sentence he would impose he would give consideration for the war record of the accused. Hart was one of the originals to go overseas. He was wounded on three occasions and was awarded a military medal.

Mr. Cunningham pointed out that while Hart had pleaded guilty to the charge, it could not be registered as a crime, and in view of the fact that the accused had a wife and two children he asked that leniency be shown. Magistrate Farrell, in imposing sentence, stated that the case was not a pleasant one for him to deal with, especially in view of the splendid war record Hart had to his credit. However, he would take this service into consideration and disposed of the case by imposing a fine of \$25 and costs, with the option of one month in jail.

Although nothing was said in court as to the article Hart carried out from the "pen," for a convict, it is understood that it was a letter.
