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NEED CHRISTIAN TRUTH IN OUR NATIONAL LIFE

The Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson Preached on "Some Canadian Problems."

Under the title of "Some Canadian Problems," Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson preached a forceful sermon in Chalmers church on Sunday morning. He referred to Dominion Day as our own national birthday, and pointed out that what we had today, was the product of the ingenuity, thought, patience and sacrifice of those who lived here before us. The speaker paid tribute to the men responsible for confederation. These men set the pace for all the world in unity of empire.

Dr. Wilson made a strong appeal for a greater and better Canada, which could only be realized by the Christian truth being brought to bear on our national life. As a young nation, Canada had a great opportunity for service.

"One great danger in Canada today," declared the speaker, "is that the very rich are becoming richer. The very poor cannot get any poorer, but the class between the two are getting a little poorer all the time. Taxes are getting harder to raise each year, and the surplus raised during the war has been used up. The standard of living must be lowered—not on essentials, but on the extravagance. Religious influence must play its part. There must be religion in the home. One of the greatest dangers is the absence of religious life in the home. The Bible must be read and taught. The children must know the scriptures for the sake of the nation."

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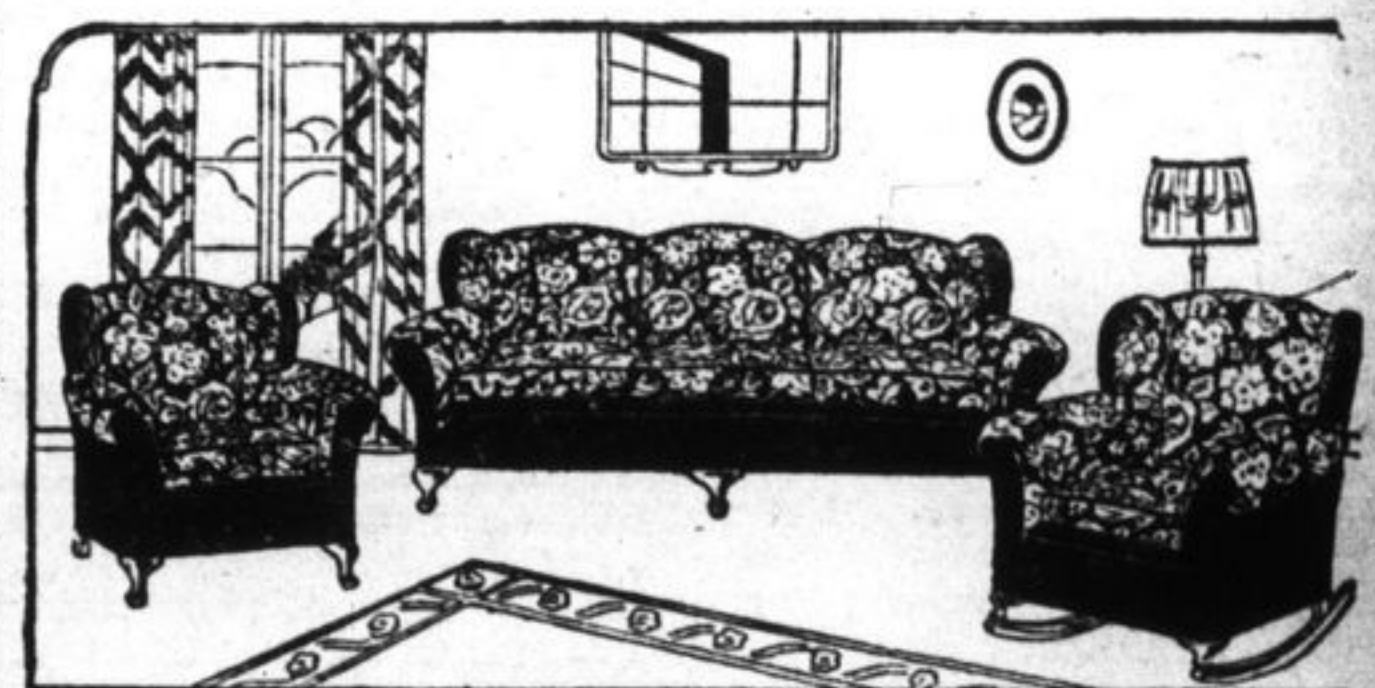
