DANGER OF RIVER ROUTE FOR LARGE VESSELS SHOWN

By the Number That Have Been Either Stranded or Sunk.

J. M. Campbell, John Donnelly and Mayor Angrove composed the Kingston delegation which appeared before the Dominion Marine Association executive at Montreal on Monday and advanced the claims of this city as the grain terminal at the foot of lake Ontario. The marine executive, to whom the Dominion government had referred the, matter of choosing a terminal, was unanimous for Kingston in view of its advantages and the dangerous route through the Thousand Islands to Prescott for large steamers.
