FIVE NOVEL WAYS TO SERVE MELONS OF THREE VARIETIES

Our markets are filled with choice of melons at this season and tuey make not only breakfast and dessert dishes, but drinks and preserves that should not be overlooked Canteloupes are perhaps th greatest favorites and are not nearly as much of a gamble as in former times. For they are planted in se ected varieties that yield a large percentage of fine melons and when we get one that is perhaps a bit green, it may be used for salad, or if too soft, it can be used up in pie. It is an economy to know what to do in each case. The breakfast melon is served halved, chilled, and with salt, or dusted with powdered sugar, according to taste. Canteloupe Salad. Halve and remove the seeds arom one or two canteloupes. Then, with a sharp teaspoon, take out the flesh in small pieces. Toss the lettuce, celery and melon in a quarter-cupful of heavy French dressing.
