EXPECT FIVE THOUSAND IN THE ORANGE PARADE

Plans Complete for the Big Demonstration in Kingston on Thursday.

The plans for the celebration of the Glorious Twelfth, Thursday have been completed, and the committee expect that there will be a monster demonstration unequalled in the history of the Orange Order in this city. There will probably be 1,000 delegates from the state of New York in addition to those from scores of lodges in the district surrounding Kingston. John McMaster will be marshal of the parade. Fully 5,000 are expected to take part in the demonstration.

The delegates from Dexter and Watertown, N.Y., will arrive by the steamer Waubic and probably another steamer at 12.30 p.m. They will be met at the wharf by H. A. Graham, and the reception committee, composed of T. A. Kidd, W. Ferguson, J. Potts, C. Posselwaite, J. McKory and J. McCammon, and the county lodge officers, A. E. Donaldson, master, and C. Wood secretary. Kingston life and drum band will be present with an escort to conduct the visitors to the Prince George hotel. The ceremony at the wharf will be a formal welcome and the presentation to the visitors of a Union Jack.

The market building has been secured for the storage of all flags, banners and other equipment to be used in the parade. The parade will be formed up in the market square at 1 p.m. and will march off with the visitors in the lead and the P.W.O.R. band. The ladies lodges will be next and the Kingston and district lodges will make up the remainder of the procession. The route of march will be along King street to William, down William street to Ontario, and along Ontario street to Princess street, up Princess to Alfred and thence to the fair grounds.

Addresses will be given by Dr. J. W. Edwards, deputy grand master of British America, Rev. John Pugham and A. W. Gray, M.P.P. There will be a baseball match and dancing in the crystal palace throughout the afternoon.

Arrangements have been made for the visitors to tour the city and inspect the city hall, court house, Queen's university, R. M. C. and other places of interest.

In view of the fact that the celebration is held in Kingston this year in honor of the 25th anniversary of the founding of the city, all residents are asked to decorate their homes with flags during the day.
