Western Canada in Need of 50,000 Harvesters.

Western Canada is in need of 50,000 Harvesters to help in the grain fields. Canadian National Railways is making special arrangements to handle the large volume of travel expected by operating special trains through to Winnipeg without change. In addition, colonist cars will also be operated on some of the regular trains and same will run through to Winnipeg. The going dates are August 13th and 22nd. The special trains will carry colonist cars of the latest design and lunch counter cars serving food and meals at reasonable prices. Special colonist cars will also be provided for women and families.

The fare from any station in the Province of Quebec, or Ontario, will be \$15 to Winnipeg plus one half cent per mile beyond to points in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, Edmonton, Tannis, Calgary, MacLeod and East. For the return journey one half cent per mile to Winnipeg plus \$20 to original starting point in the East.
