GREAT NEED OF RAIN; CROPS MAY BE RUINED

Many Farmers Are Engaged Carrying Water For Their Cattle.

Conditions are quite serious some parts of this district as a result of the continued dry spell. Near Odessa it was learned on Wednesday morning, that farmers are engaged in drawing water from a creek in order to get water for their cattle, all the wells and pumps having gone dry. In some sections of the country there has not been rain in over two months and the outlook now is that crops will be ruined. According to information received, the hay crop is wonderful. In fact it is so heavy that many farmers have been unable to get it stored. and many have had to stack it up. One farmer stated on Wednesday that he had taken in 134 loads. And the hay is of good quality too.
