THE BANDITS WERE SEEN

By Three Men And At Three Different Occasions.

SENT NOTE TO NEWSPAPER

Bandit Told of Going to the Theatres And Made Threats Against Police.

Toronto, Aug. 1.—Information received by the police indicates that the Toronto bank robbers whose car was found in a barn ten miles north-east of Toronto, camped in the vicinity of the barn from last Wednesday, the day following the robbery, until Monday morning.

About one o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, Leslie Sanderson a teamster, employed on the farm, saw three men coming away from the barn, where the car obtained by the gunmen were found, and driving north in a big motor car. One of these men was dark complexioned and very stout and heavy.

At 7.30 Friday morning William Bone saw two men running from the back of the barn, and saw three others going north through an oak field towards a car which was waiting in the distance.

Sunday morning about ten o'clock Jack Alton, another employee of the farm, and who lives about half a mile south, near the old shilly mill, came across four men bathing naked in the river Don at an unfrequented spot. One of these men was a stout, dark-skinned man; there was no sign of clothing anywhere.

Never suspecting bandits he ordered them away and did not see where they went.

This afternoon a squad of city police armed with rifles are searching the vicinity between the barn and the city.

The Toronto Telegram reproduces a letter received by the editor two days after the robbery, purporting to have been written by one of the desperadoes. Little attention was paid to the letter then, but the paper received information indicating that it was genuine.

The information came from a man who refused to give his name, but who consented to tell his story also to Inspector Guthrie, of Detective Department.

Supposed Bandit Note.
The letter, neatly pencilled on the back of a piece of glazed paper taken from a cigar box, was written—so it is alleged, by the leader of the gang.

The letter, written (and also addressed) in lead pencil, the words being printed instead of written, to lessen chances of detection, read as follows:

"Now that almost thirty-six hours have elapsed since we started the 'spectacular hold-up,' we feel perfectly safe in dropping you a line. We were sorry that we were compelled to wing those messengers, but had they obeyed our instructions no harm would have befallen them. Yesterday evening we went to the theatre. Today we are going to town till Saturday.

"You might inform the police, that includes both 'harnes bulls' and 'dicks,' that if one of them looks like he wants to pinch us we will get him, and if by any chance one of us bunch gets nailed we will get every dick on the force. 'We know them all.'

"If we are left alone we will not pull any more jobs here, but if we are bothered we will raise hell."

"This paper and envelope has been handed with gloves on."
