THE HAGUE—Rumors that a sumptuous yacht, the "Hohenzollern," flying the imperial German flag, dropped anchor off the island of Wieringer and took on board the former German crown-prince, are being connected with the hasty visit of the crown-prince to his father, the ex-Emperor, at Doorn, and the occasion at the villa of Captain von Ibsen, which the crown-prince is spending when the imperial flag was also boldly raised.

These activities of the Hohenzollerns, coupled with those of royalists in Germany, seem to indicate that a hopeful outlook for the Kaiser's return to Berlin is seen.

French Woman Faces Death Penalty For Shooting Her Husband, Egyptian Prince

LONDON—A verdict of murder has been returned against Princess Ali Kamel-Fahmy Bey, a French woman, accused of shooting her husband in their luxurious suite at the Savoy Hotel.

Witnesses testified the couple quarrelled incessantly, slapped each other in public, and slept with revolvers under their pillows. If sentenced to death, she will be the second woman to die on the gallows in London this year, the first being Mrs. Edith Thompson, hung with Frederick Bywaters for killing the woman's husband.

At least once in the summer every housewife experiences the disappointment of having her milk or cream sour. Yet this disappointment is one which may be turned to usefulness by the following cake recipes:

Sour Milk Chocolate Cake: Melt one square of unsweetened chocolate (shaved) and add to it one-fourth cup of butter; blend the two until the butter is soft and mushy, then cool slightly before adding the following ingredients:

S. Smith: "Please tell me how to make Russian Dressing."
Answer: Mayonnaise salad dressing is the foundation for Russian Dressing. Any of the bottled commercial brands of Mayonnaise are good. Add to this Mayonnaise one tablespoon of tomato catsup, one teaspoon of Picamilli (or chopped green tomato or chopped green pepper may be substituted, instead), and one tablespoon of finely-minced raw onion. Chill and serve on crisp lettuce leaves. (This dressing is so rich and delicious in itself that it is generally served on plain lettuce or romaine—hardly ever on a fruit, vegetable, or meat salad.)

Beginner: "How are bananas baked?"
Answer: Loosen the skin so that the fruit may be slipped out, but do not take it out until after baking. Bake for 30 minutes, remove skin, and cover with a sauce made by boiling one-half cup of sugar and one-half cup of water together for five minutes, then adding a teaspoon of butter and the juice of half a lemon.

Camper: "What is a good game for a crowd to play when sitting around a camp fire?"
Answer: I know of nothing funnier than "Lecturing." In this game a subject, at random, is given to everybody in turn. And each person must lecture seriously on his particular subject. For instance, you might give "Fans" to someone; that person must try to talk interesting on this topic, perhaps tellings of Japanese fans, of the earliest known fans, and of the latest fashion in fans, using five minutes for his Lecture. Other topics could be "Wild Animals," "Road-Beds," "Music," etc., etc. You see, any topic at all will do. That is the fun of it. Of course the more jokes the "lecturer" can get into his talk, the funnier it will be. But the chief source of amusement will be found in shortage of information when the lecturer displays in dealing with his particular topic!

redients: one well-beaten egg-yolk creamed with one cup of granulated sugar, one cup of thick sour milk (or one cup of heavy sour cream) with one teaspoon of soda dissolved in it, and one and one-half cups of flour. Add a pinch of salt and one teaspoon of vanilla, then turn the mixture into a buttered loaf-cake pan and bake for 40 minutes in a slow oven. (Use the egg-white for the frosting.)

Sour Milk Spice Cake: Cream together one cup of sugar and one-half cup of butter. Add one slightly beaten egg, one cup of sour milk with one teaspoon of soda dissolved in it, two cups of flour sifted with one-half teaspoon each of salt, ground cloves and ground cinnamon, and, last, stir in one cup of large seedless raisins cut small. Turn the mixture into a buttered loaf-cake pan and bake 40 minutes in a medium oven.

White Cake Made With Sour Milk: Cream together one cup of sugar and one heaping tablespoon of butter. Add one cup of sour milk in which one-half teaspoon of soda has been dissolved, one and two-thirds cups of flour sifted with one teaspoon of baking powder, and, last, fold in two stiffly-whipped egg-whites. Turn into a buttered pan and bake 45 minutes in a slow oven. (If a white cake is not desired, an ordinary yellow cake can be made by this recipe by using one whole egg (white and yolk) instead of the two egg-whites and no yolk, called for.)

Molasses-Nut Spice Cake: Cream together one cup of sugar and two-thirds of a cup of butter; add one whole egg and the yolk of another, one-half cup of molasses, one cup of sour milk in which one teaspoon of soda has been dissolved, three cups of flour sifted with one-half teaspoon of ground cloves, cinnamon, nutmeg and mace, and, last, add one cup of seedless raisins and nuts cut up finely. Bake in a buttered loaf-cake pan for 40 minutes in a moderate oven. Tomorrow.—Crouching A.; Oriental Puff Bag.
