23-25—Fair weather expected.

26-27—Unsettled and showers.

28-31—Pleasant, with a dry spell running into September.

28-31—Balmy air.

If we get any frost in September it will not be until after the sun crosses the line.

We see articles in the papers every few days about weather we are going to have caused by changes in the planets or in the moon and several other things which give us ideas of weather we are going to have in the future.

In making my forecasts I do not go by any of these signs, nor do I believe in them. I do believe when we have an electric storm that it will give us cooler weather for a short time.
