 Dr. F. P. Carr-Harris, who has spent many years in the district of Honan, China, as a medical missionary, is a visitor in Ottawa for a few days, and is staying at the University Club. Before going to China Dr. Carr-Harris was a resident of Kingston.

Will Wait for Him.
 Wilbert Edgewood, sentenced at Belleville to serve two years at Portsmouth penitentiary for obtaining money by false pretences, has reached the prison. Miss Mabel Cook, Edgewood's sweetheart, bade him a tearful farewell, and told one of the officers that she would wait twenty-five years for him.

Passed Away at Cape Vincent, N.Y.
 F. R. Gardner, Cape Vincent, N.Y., aged fifty-five years, died on Aug. 8th, after a year's illness. He was for a time with the Cleveland Seed company and was in their Platon office. In 1919 he went into the Jefferson county National bank. In 1920 he had to quit because of ill health. His widow, his father and one brother survive, all living at Cape Vincent. He was a prominent Mason.

Lived Many Years in Perth.
 After conducting his harness business as usual last Friday, John A. Ferrier, Perth, was suddenly seized with illness that night and death followed early on Saturday, the news of which caused a great shock. The late John A. Ferrier was born in Perth on Dec. 17th, 1850, of Scottish parents who in the early days had founded a harness and saddlery business in Perth in which he was an apprentice. In his earlier days he resided in the United States.

Gun Never at Bunker Hill.
 Major-General Neilson, Quebec, a former Kingstonian, has disclosed the history of the famous Quebec fortress cannon which Canadians claim was captured at the battle of Bunker Hill. He wrote thus: "In November, 1871, Captain Montzambert (another former Kingstonian) in cleaning up old storage places in the rear of the St. Louis street military barracks, Quebec, found the old cannon. Major Tapp recognized the cannon as having been captured by his father on the high seas."

Harvesters Needed.
 More harvesters than ever will be needed this year, in Western Canada, on account of the bumper crop. Special trains will be run by the Canadian Pacific Railway, which is advertising the usual low rate of \$15 to Winnipeg, plus a half-cent per mile beyond to destinations in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. Returning the fare will be \$20 from Winnipeg, plus a half-cent per mile from starting point. Going dates are August 13th and 22nd. On the lunch cars food and refreshments may be obtained at reasonable prices. Special cars will be provided for ladies, children (full fare) and their escorts. First special train will leave Toronto on each date at 10 a.m., last special at 10:30 p.m. on each date. Full information may be secured from any Canadian Pacific ticket office.

A Former Kingstonian.
 Rev. Dr. George Macbeth Milligan, pastor emeritus of Old St. Andrew's, Presbyterian church, Toronto, passed his eighty-third milestone on Saturday. It is now thirteen years since a nervous breakdown compelled Dr. Milligan to retire from the pastorate which for twenty-four years he had held with such distinction and great

lyfing results. The evening of his life finds him, with all his keen mental powers unabated, living in the old manse at 400 Sherbourne street, where he has resided now for more than forty-seven years. Dr. Milligan was a schoolteacher on Wolfe Island, and graduated at Queen's University in 1862.

Courses for Farm Youth.
 Kingston has been selected as one of the centres where agricultural instruction will be given from Nov. 27th to March 2nd, under direction of the Ontario minister of agriculture. The boys will be instructed in the principles of farming and given foundational data upon which they can continue to develop progressive agricultural methods. The girls, for their part, are also included in the plan and, by parallel courses, they will be schooled to meet the problems of home life which arise in rural districts. No fees are charged the students who take the instruction, and, as government bulletins furnish the principal texts studied, there are practically no expenses for books. Sons and daughters of farmers between the ages of sixteen and thirty-five are eligible. The classes commence at nine o'clock in the morning, and are dismissed at four o'clock in the afternoon.

Applications for Position.
 Concerning the appointment of the soldiers' advisors to assist applicants in handling pension and treatment cases before members of the Federal Appeal Board, one appointment is being made covering the Eastern Ontario district and the nominations for this appointment are now being received by the eastern district committee of the Ontario council, Dominion Veterans' Alliance. Recommendations to the minister of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment for the appointment will be made at a meeting of the committee in Ottawa, on August 16th. Those who are qualified are advised of the opportunity of making application prior to that date. Applications for the position will be considered by the minister only when

placed through the committee, address T. C. Lapp, Ottawa, Secretary, Eastern District, Ontario Provincial Council, Dominion Veterans' Alliance.

Western Canada in Need of 50,000 Harvesters.

Western Canada is in need of 50,000 Harvesters to help in the grain fields. Canadian National Railways is making special arrangements to handle the large volume of travel expected by operating special trains through to Winnipeg without change. In addition, colonist cars will also be operated on some of the regular trains and same will run through to Winnipeg. The going dates are August 13th and 22nd. The special trains will carry colonist cars of the latest design and lunch counter cars serving food and meals at reasonable prices. Special colonist cars will also be provided for women and families.

The fare from any station in the Province of Quebec, or Ontario, will be \$15 to Winnipeg plus one half cent per mile beyond to points in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, Edmonton, Tannis, Calgary, MacLeod and East. For the return journey one half cent per mile to Winnipeg plus \$20 to original starting joint in the East.
