THE VOICE OF THE PULPIT

A Real United Church of Canada Congregation at Chalmers Church.

In an address on church union given on Sunday morning to the congregations of Chalmers Presbyterian and Sydenham street Methodist churches, which are holding united services during the summer, Prof. A. J. Johnson, Victoria college, Toronto, remarked that he was addressing probably the most remarkable assemblage in Canada. His audience included really three churches, as the First Congregational church of Kingston was now permanently united with Chalmers Presbyterian church. So that it was a sample congregation of the coming United Church of Canada to which he was preaching.

At St. Andrew's Church. "Work, thought and prayer" was the keynote of a very inspiring sermon given in St. Andrew's church on Sunday morning by Rev. J. Y. MacKinnon, of Halifax, N.S., before a large congregation. A knowledge of the Bible, which should be the guide of every man and woman in their daily life, was indispensable in this breathless age, and was indeed a consolation to many, he said. There was perhaps too much excitement in the world today and a calm outlook on the future would be of great assistance in bringing back the affairs of nations to normal.

At Cooke's Church. Rev. C. E. Kidd, Gananouque, was the preacher at both services in Cooke's Presbyterian church on Sunday and gave the congregation two very interesting discourses. Mrs. Mackinnon, wife of Rev. Mr. Mackinnon, Halifax, presided at the organ at both services. Mrs. Tremear rendered a solo at the morning service and Miss Diack sang in the evening.
