### TOURISTS MAY BRING DUTY-FREE SMOKES

But Quantity is Limited to Forty Cigars and Hundred Cigarettes.

Ottawa, Aug. 14.—An impression prevails that any person entering Canada from the United States or elsewhere is allowed under the Customs regulations, to bring in free of duty two or three hundred cigarettes, a pound or two of tobacco, and a certain quantity of cigars. It is pointed out by the customs department that this is not the case. Non-residents of Canada are allowed to bring in, under certain conditions, 40 cigars or 100 cigarettes, or one pound of tobacco only, and this must be for personal use. This does not apply to Canadians who may be returning from another country to Canada. They have no such privileges.

The customs department believes that it is possible that this impression accounts for a great deal of petty smuggling which has been indulged in by Canadians, who probably would not knowingly infringe on the laws of their country. Instructions have now been given by

the customs authorities to all officers that the law as above stated must be rigidly enforced. The wording of the customs regulations is as follows:

"Forty cigars or less and 100 cigarettes or less, in open packages, found in the baggage of a traveller not being a resident of Canada may be delivered free of duty."

Customs officials state that the smuggling of cigarettes has fallen off greatly since the duties were lowered.

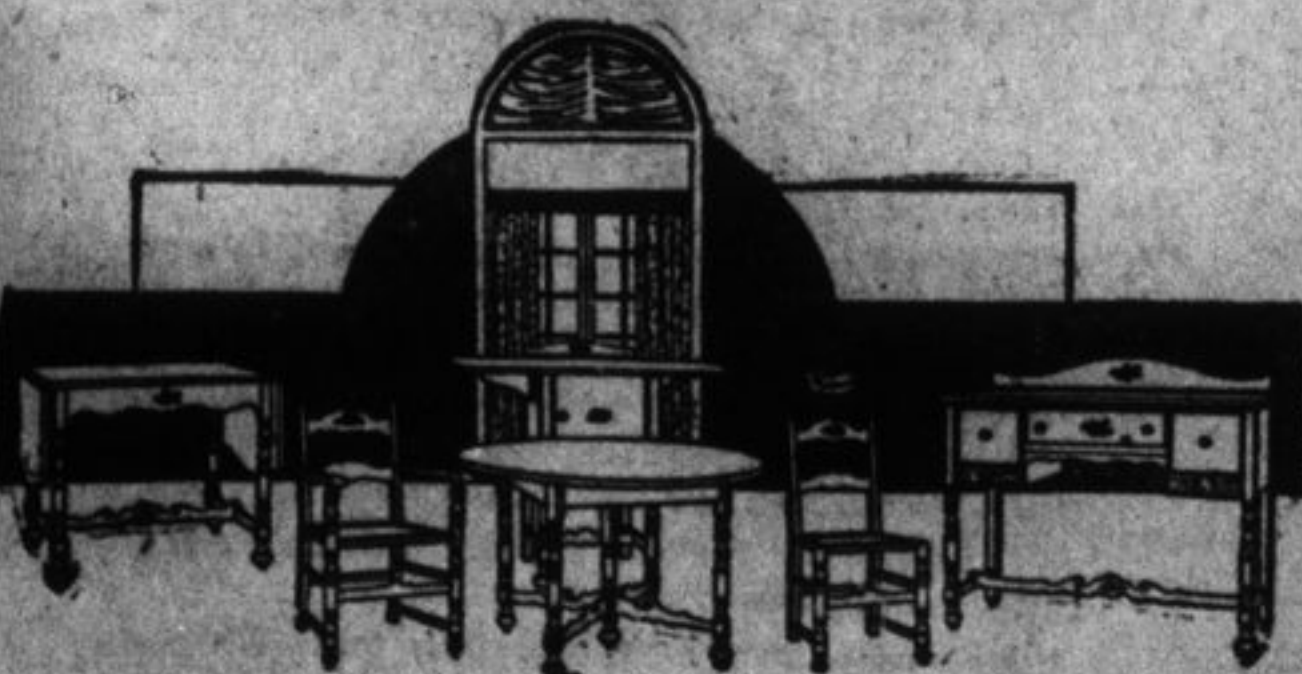
