Busy At Queen's.
Already there is activity around the buildings at Queen's in preparation for the opening of the fall term. "Billie" Hugoes returned from a trip by motor a few days ago and has started getting his training rooms and equipment in order. The new library is taking definite shape in a satisfactory manner.

Iroquois War Memorial.
A meeting of the executive of the Women's Institute, the Public Library, and the G.W.V.A. was held in Iroquois, to consider the erection of a war memorial. The opinion was that the most feasible and suitable memorial was that of a Community Hall, built on the government grounds. A committee was appointed to secure definite information and report at once.

Fire at Lavant.
Peter Cavers, secretary of the Lusk County Farmers' Mutual Fire Insurance Co., received a telephone message on Tuesday that the residence of James V. Reid, in Lavant township had been destroyed by fire. Burning shingles from the house were blown to a nearby hay field and the crop was also destroyed. The fire raged through brush and fields for a distance of about four miles.

Again on Duty.
Mrs. Robinson, Victorian Nurse, has returned after a few months' absence on account of illness, and is again to be found on duty at the Welfare Station, corner Barrie and York streets. The mothers who look to the station for advice and help are delighted at her return, for they know and appreciate the splendid work she has been doing. Now that Mrs. Robinson is again on duty, the work will go forward with old-time energy and success.

Accepted a Vice-Presidency.
Sir Allen Aylesworth, senator, who was minister of justice in the Laurier cabinet, and was also British commissioner in the Behring Sea arbitration, has joined the U.E.L. celebration corporation, 1924, and accepted the office of vice-president. This will be a great help to the celebration of the 140th anniversary of the settlement of Upper Canada to be held next year at Belleville, as Sir Allen is a member of one of the old U.E.L. families who settled in the Bay of Quinte district.

Sportsmen Have Hopes.
The bass fishing in the vicinity of Kingston and Amherst Island has been so poor within the last few years that sportsmen have come to regard this district as very poor ground. One of the reasons for it has been the killing of game fish by hundreds and with the activity of game inspectors recently this should be stopped and the waters become well stocked once more. There has been a rumor that the netting has not been done entirely by Canadians but no proof as yet.

A Golden Jubilee.
Preparations are being made for the commemoration of the golden jubilee in the priesthood of the Right Rev. George Corbet, V. G., pastor of St. Columba's, Cornwall,

under the chairmanship of Judge O'Reilly and Mrs. H. W. Snetsinger. The vicar's jubilee — fifty years in the priesthood — thirty-three of which have been spent as vicar-general of the diocese of Alexandria and pastor of St. Columba's — will undoubtedly afford his parishioners and many friends, a worthy opportunity of manifesting their gratitude, admiration and love for him. The date selected is Sept. 12th. Vicar-General Corbet was formerly of Kingston diocese.

Funeral on Sunday.
The body of Dr. J. W. Simmons, Frankford, who died in the Kingston General Hospital, was buried on Sunday. Deceased was a public-spirited man, highly regarded in his profession and will be much missed. At one time he was postmaster of Frankford. He is survived by his wife, Nora Arnold, one daughter, Anita (Mrs. George N. Rogers, Belleville), two sons, Dr. Jack Simmons, Broad Street Hospital, New York, and Grant A., at home; also three grandsons, Jack, Harry and Allan Rogers. Deceased was sixty-two years of age.
