THEFT CASE DISMISSED; EVIDENCE INSUFFICIENT

But Mrs. Smalley and John Carter Now Face O.T.A. Violation Charge.

Stating that there was not sufficient evidence to form a conviction, Judge Lavell on Tuesday afternoon dismissed the charge of theft preferred against John Carter, by Arthur Smalley, and following this Crown Attorney T. J. Rigney withdrew the charge of theft preferred against Mrs. Smalley. It was alleged that the theft was committed on July 23rd, the date on which Mrs. Smalley eloped to Windsor, Ont., with Carter. The runaway couple were rounded up at Windsor by Provincial Constable Roy Clark and brought back to Kingston.

Following the hearing of the charge against Carter, the case took another sensational turn when Smalley and Carter were charged with breaches of the O. T. A. In their evidence, both Smalley and Carter told about securing liquor and taking it over to the country club in Barriefield, where Smalley is engaged as a steward. These charges will be heard by Justice of the Peace Allison.

Carter was charged with stealing \$10.15 from Smalley and he entered a plea of "not guilty" and was defended by A. Revelle.

Smalley, on being called by Mr. Rigney, stated that he was employed by the Country Club, in Barriefield, as a steward. He and his wife had quarters at the club, and on July 23rd, when the alleged theft took place, Carter was a guest at his home. Mrs. Smalley was engaged at the club as a cook. Carter came to the club on July 20th or 21st. On July 23rd Carter complained to the witness that he was ill, and witness and Carter secured a taxi and came over to the city. They secured some liquor on prescriptions secured from a couple of local physicians. Carter paid for the liquor.

Found His Wife Missing.

Witness stated that after drinking some of the liquor he became dizzy and went to bed. He awoke about 3 o'clock in the morning, and found his wife and Carter missing. On making an examination of the cash box, in which he kept the funds of the club, he found that he had been robbed of \$10.15. He said the box had contained \$26. There was a cheque for \$5 and the remainder was in cash.

Continuing his evidence, witness stated that he waited for a couple of days to see if he could find trace of his wife, and when she failed to appear, he first reported his loss to the club and afterwards notified Constable Roy Clark. Later on, witness went to Detroit and Windsor, and found his wife at the latter place. He also located Carter in Windsor, and both Carter and his wife denied having taken the money. Carter admitted to the witness that he had tied up the cash box with a shoe string before he went away. Carter said he had located the cash box when he was assisting Mrs. Smalley to pack her trunk.

Evidence of Constable.

Provincial Constable Roy Clark said he had been notified of the theft by Smalley on July 26th. He told of going to Windsor and finding Mrs. Smalley there with Carter. Carter admitted having had the cash box in his hands, but declared that he had not taken any of the money. He said he had tied the box up with a shoe string.

Hugh Carter, a brother of the accused, who recently came out to this country from Liverpool, swore that he was in Windsor and heard Smalley say that he did not believe Carter stole the money.

John Carter, the accused, gave evidence. He said that he arrived at Smalley's quarters in Barriefield on July 20th, and had with him \$19. He told about coming over to the city on July 23rd, with Smalley, and securing liquor and drinking at Smalley's quarters in Barriefield. He said that after drinking the liquor Smalley went mad, that he kicked over the stove and ordered witness and Mrs. Smalley out of the house. Mrs. Smalley told witness about the money in the cash box, and witness said he did not think it was wise to leave the money in view of Smalley's condition. Witness said he tied the cash box up with a shoe string. Witness asked Mrs. Smalley to accompany him to Windsor. He had asked her several times, and that on the evening of July 23rd, she consented. Witness said he had \$41 of his own money when he left for Windsor.

The accused said he was twenty-two years old, and came out from Liverpool on June 1st. Mrs. Smalley was a passenger on the same steamer. He was engaged as a sealer, prior to coming to Canada, and was engaged in the merchant marine. Smalley was not aware that witness had made proposals to his wife to run away with him. He and Mrs. Smalley stayed in Toronto for a couple of days on their way to Windsor. While in Toronto witness sold a banjo for \$30 and also sold some of his clothing, in order to secure more funds for their trip to Windsor.

Wife Gives Evidence.

Mrs. Smalley also gave evidence. She said that Carter had handled the cash box before they left Kingston, but swore that he did not take any of the money. Carter had plenty of money. Witness declared that her husband was drunk the night she left with Carter, but stated that she did

not see her husband or Carter drinking.

Judge Lavell said he could not find a conviction on the evidence and dismissed the charge, whereupon Mr. Rigney withdrew the charge of theft against Mrs. Smalley. The liquor charges against Carter and Smalley were laid after the hearing of the charges of theft.

Queen's University Leads Canada in Giving Complete Summer Course of Study.

The increasingly popular summer school term at Queen's University closes Wednesday afternoon. The students are busy clearing up all the exercises and work so they may get back to their homes for a few holidays before they take up their duties in their respective schools. Queen's summer school has grown wonderfully in the past few years both in numbers and advantages. This year the registration has reached 423, of which thirty-five are sisters, in religion, and these students represent every province in Canada, even some students from the United States.

The popularity of Queen's summer school is due to the fact that it offers a splendid summer vacation and training for a degree combined. The beautiful surroundings of the university, the excellent tennis courts and soft-ball grounds, the golf club and numerous other out-door diversions offer all that a student can desire. The list of subjects offered was as follows: English, French, Spanish, Latin, Greek, history, economics, mathematics, history, philosophy, geology, physics, chemistry, and biology.

The remarkable thing about the number of courses is that they have been made possible entirely through the energy of the students themselves, and the final list of courses for the summer school of 1924 will also be so determined. The much discussed and desired third term may come into force next year, offering increased advantages to teachers, thus placing Queen's as the only university in Canada where a hard working teacher may secure a complete training in the summer months.
