### CARTER DID NOT APPEAR

But Was Fined \$200 and Costs For Having Liquor at Country Club

"John Carter, John Carter," called out Provincial Constable Roy Clark, in a stentorian voice, at a session of the court presided over by Justices of the Peace Alinson and Cannon, on Wednesday afternoon.

But John Carter did not appear to answer to the charge lodged against him, that of "keeping liquor for sale or barter, without a license." Evidence was taken in the case, and the accused was fined \$200 and costs, with the option of six months in jail. A Revellie appeared on his behalf and following the hearing of the case a warrant was issued for Carter's arrest.

The charge against Carter was laid following evidence given before Judge Lavell, on Wednesday afternoon, when Carter was charged with stealing \$10.15 from Arthur Smalley. Judge Lavell dismissed this charge, after hearing the evidence. Carter and Smalley admitted taking liquor to the Country Club, in Barrieffield, where Smalley was employed as steward, and drinking the liquor there. A similar charge was also lodged against Smalley. The latter was called as a witness in the case against Carter, but on being called by C. R. Webster, who conducted the prosecution, he refused to give evidence unless he had the protection of the court.

Mr. Revellie, acting for Carter, objected to the court giving such protection and asked that his objection be noted.

Mr. Webster contended that the court could give Smalley the protection asked for but Mr. Revellie contended that this protection could only be given in a criminal case.

However, the court granted the witness protection, and he gave evidence. He stated that on July 23rd, Carter had liquor and took it over to the Country Club in Barrieffield, and that he and the witness drank some of the liquor at the club house. Witness said the club was owned by a number of members, who contributed to its upkeep. He had been hired by the club as a steward, and Carter was a guest at his quarters.

To Mr. Revellie, witness admitted that he was with Carter when the latter got prescriptions from two local doctors, and secured the liquor from local drug stores.

Following the evidence of Smalley the court found Carter "guilty" and imposed a fine of \$200 and costs, or six months in jail.

Carter was taken in charge on Tuesday afternoon and allowed out on \$100 bail and the court gave an order for the bail money to be forfeited.

Smalley was arraigned on a charge similar to that made against Carter and entered a plea "not guilty." As there was no evidence offered against him, the charge was dismissed. Carter laid the complaint against Smalley. It was stated that Carter was in the city on Wednesday morning.

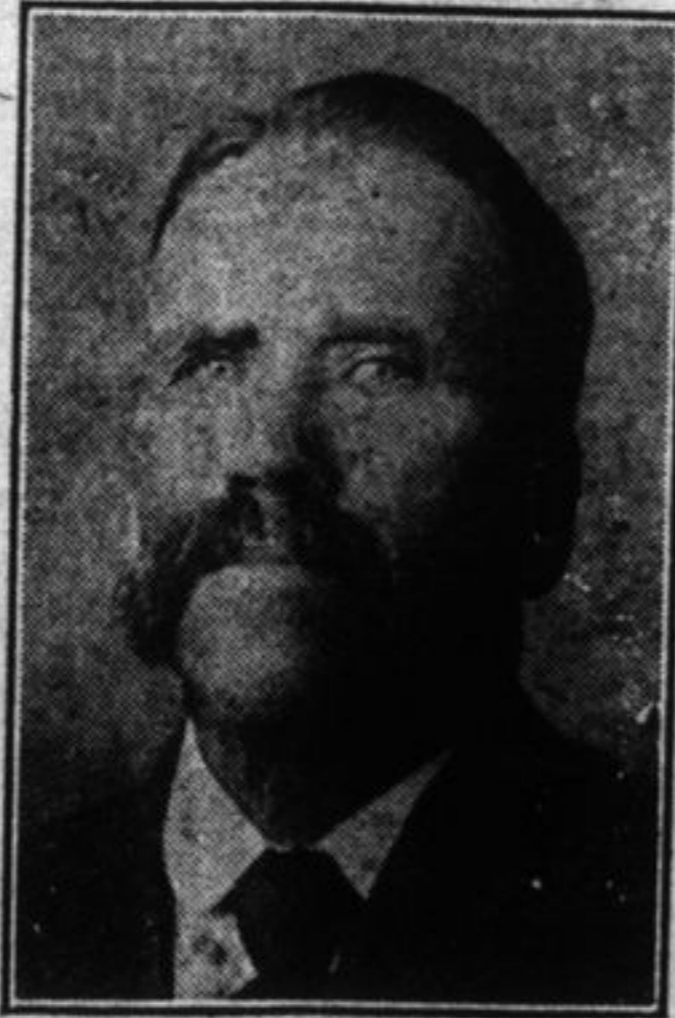

The Canadian General Electric Co., The Marconi Wireless Telegraph Co. of Canada, The Canadian Westinghouse Co., The Bell Telephone Co., The Northern Electric Co., and the International Western Electric Co. have now agreed to pool all their patents for the common good. Under the terms of the agreement each party agrees to license the other parties within their natural fields, that is, the Marconi Co. will have the use of all the patents derived under the agreement for the purpose of wireless telegraphy, the Telephone Company in the fields of public telephone communication and the manufacturing companies which includes the Marconi Co. have the right to make and sell.

The importance of having the best and most efficient radio apparatus will appeal strongly to the ever growing number of people who listen in on the daily programmes sent out by broadcasting stations throughout Canada and United States and who will welcome every improvement in the art.

Many patents have been issued covering the use of these tubes and apparatus and systems involving their use in connection with wire telephony, guided-wave telephony, power apparatus, wireless telegraphy, wireless telephony and broadcasting. Certain large companies hold a very substantial portion of these patents but no one company could manufacture or use apparatus combining all the features covered by such patents without incurring litigation. For this reason the art was being held back as no one could manufacture the best and most complete apparatus.

At the suggestion of the federal government of the United States certain companies in United States have thrown their patents into a common

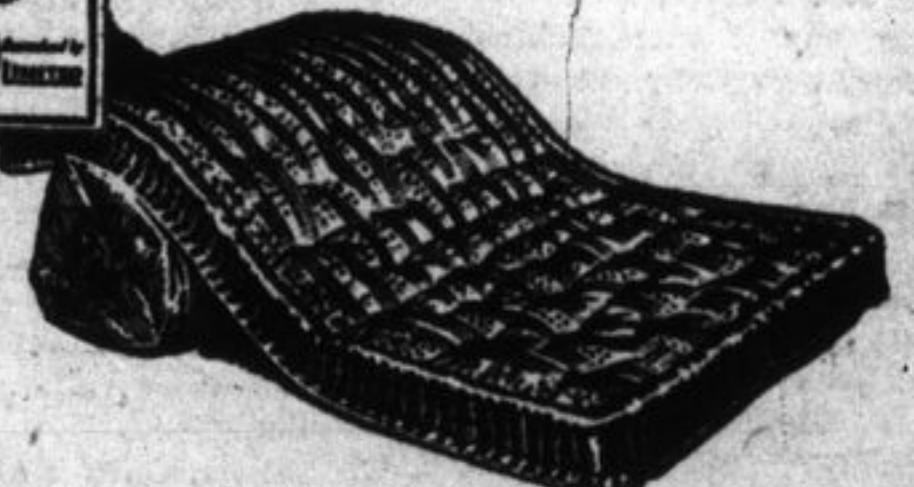
