Montreal, Aug 20 .- Sir William Nicholis, president of The Mill As thing possible to get the game here sociated Industries, Limited, a great English flour milling combination, who with Lady Nicholls, ar rived at Quebec by the Empress of France, on Wednesday last, on business connected with hir company, received an urgent cablegram, on Saturday, which compelled him to return. He said he had not aband. oned his business ideas and looked forward to an early return to Canada to carry out his plans in connection with the large interests he has here.

He spoke of business conditions in England due to the national political situation and said, while Canada was crying out for men, there were approximately two million out of employment in England who had to be fed. He also said the weight of taxation in England was cramping business in general and the delay in settling the Ruhr was practically crushing Europe.
