"Glad to meetcha."

**DELAY CRUSHING EUROPE, SAYS SIR W. NICHOLLS**

He Was Called Back to England From Quebec On Arrival There.

Montreal, Aug. 20.—Sir William Nicholls, president of The Mill Associated Industries, Limited, a great English flour milling combination, who with Lady Nicholls, arrived at Quebec by the Empress of France, on Wednesday last, on business connected with his company, received an urgent cablegram, on Saturday, which compelled him to return. He said he had not abandoned his business ideas and looked forward to an early return to Canada to carry out his plans in connection with the large interests he has here.

He spoke of business conditions in England due to the national political situation and said, while Canada was crying out for men, there were approximately two million out of employment in England who had to be fed. He also said the weight of taxation in England was cramping business in general and the delay in settling the Ruhr was practically crushing Europe.

**ELEVEN LIQUOR LADEN AUTOS FALL INTO NET**

Six Men Are Arrested—Nine others Abandon Machines and Flee.

Malone, N.Y., Aug. 20.—Eleven liquor laden autos carrying a combined cargo of 8,472 quarts of alleged Canadian ale, destined as worth close to \$10,000, at bootleg prices in downstate cities, were seized just before dawn on Sunday by a group of federal prohibition agents, aided by state troopers working out of Malone, near Mooers, Clinton county.

The capture was biggest effected in the border country this year. It was all accomplished within a half-hour and an area of one mile.

Six men were arrested. In the darkness of the morning and a blinding downpour of rain nine others abandoned their machines and fled. Guns were brought into play by several of the latter in a desperate attempt to halt pursuit as they fled across the fields.

While none of the officers was struck, one of the sextet arrested was hit in the leg by a bullet from a gun of one of his own number. The bullet penetrated the flesh and lodged in his leg, but his condition is not regarded as serious.

**FIRE NEAR WESTBROOKE IS QUITE SERIOUS YET Kept From Doing Damage to Home by Band of Twenty-five Men.**

The bush fire on the property of Messrs. Kemp, Welsh and Trudell, between Collin's Bay and Westbrooke has assumed serious proportions and on Sunday, when seen by a Whig representative, was only kept from doing damage to the homes of the last named farmers by the exertions of a band of twenty-five men who were fighting the flames. Water was drawn with great difficulty through the woods, where the fire had already left its mark, in a large oil tank and heaters worked at the edge of the swamp to save the houses and a fine maple grove. Mrs. W. H. Rankin, whose property adjoins Mr. Kemp's, has had a large party at work to keep the fire from entering her land. Only a heavy rain can put out the fire.

The fire that raged in the vicinity of Oudessa is reported out but owing to the highly inflammable nature of the vegetation and the trees, a close watch is being kept to prevent it breaking out again. The last place it appeared was on A. Enloe's property.

**Auto Mechanic Arrested.**

A young automobile mechanic was taken into custody Monday morning by the police on a charge of stealing tools from a local service station. His case will be dealt with by the police magistrate on Tuesday.

**Sang In St. George's.**

Arthur Craig, Toronto, sang "Just as I Am" (Hawley), at the morning service in St. George's cathedral on Sunday, in excellent voice, and this former Kingston soloist was heard with pleasure. At evensong, Messrs. C. B. S. Harvey and Warburton sang as a duet, "Cruelty" (Faure), their voices blending most effectively.

**CHILDREN WERE TAKEN TO THE MAYOR'S OFFICE**

The Infants Home Will Not Care for Them Owing to City's Action.

The deadlock between the city, the Children's Aid Society and the Infants' Home came to a crisis Monday morning when the Infants' Home refused to keep two Children's Aid Society wards and sent them to the office of the Society in the City Hall. From there they were taken to the office of Mayor Angrove, who was interviewed by Mrs. MacPhail, Mrs. A. L. Clarke and W. Black, local agents.

As a result of the action of the Infants' Home the two children are now temporary wards of the city. The mayor pointed out his position regarding the accounts rendered for the maintenance of the wards at the home, and produced a letter from the city solicitor who stated that the delay in adjusting the matter was due to the failure of the society's solicitor to render the accounts up to date. As soon as the accounts are received up to Sept. 1st, the city solicitor will be in a position to pass upon them and thus enable the treasurer and auditor to act in accordance with the laws in such cases.

Mayor Angrove was quite ready to take charge of the children, having made arrangements for suitable homes for them upon receipt of the notification that they were to be placed in his charge. He felt, however, that they properly belonged to the Children's Aid Society and he would not be justified in making a final disposition of them until each case was investigated.

In the meantime the children are in the care of the Children's Aid Society.

**Held a Reception.**

On Sunday afternoon a delightful reception was held at the home of Mrs. J. Abramsky, 474 Barrie street, in honor of her daughter, Miss Annie Abramsky, who is to be married on August 28th. The reception was attended by only members of the family, and a pleasing part of it was the presentation to Miss Annie Abramsky of a cheque for \$4,000 on the Bank of Toronto, from her father, J. Abramsky, while her brothers, Harry and Samuel Abramsky each presented her with a cheque for \$100 and her brother Moses Abramsky gave a cheque for \$50, while a \$50 cheque was also given by her grandmother, Mrs. Abramsky of Boston, Mass. After the reception the entire party motored to Batterssea, and spent the remainder of the day.

**Residence in Escott Village Is Destroyed by Fire**

The village of Escott, in Leeds county, and on the provincial highway, was the scene of a serious fire on Sunday afternoon when a frame residence, owned by John Wilson and occupied by John Hunt, caught fire from a defective stove or chimney, in so far as can be ascertained, and despite the efforts of the villagers was completely destroyed with all its contents. A bucket brigade was quickly formed, but the slow method and the scarcity of water was ineffectual against the great headway gained by the fire. Mr. Hunt and his family of nine children were all unharmed and are being cared for by neighbors.

**FOUR ARE DROWNED WHEN SKIFFS SINK**

Two Other Bodies Found.

The bodies of the other two girls drowned on Sunday in Collin's Lake, (those of Rosie Meltz and Evelyn Gollighey were found by the search party about 9 o'clock on Monday morning. The bodies were found in about eight feet of water just a few yards from the scene of the over-turned boat. Up to present time no trace had been found of George Sakell.

The search party left the city at 4 o'clock on Monday morning well-equipped with grappling hooks, etc., and seven boats were used in a systematic search of the lake. The vicinity of the accident was minutely covered and after five hours the bodies of two of the girls were seen on the bottom of the lake. Two of the girls were together, while the other was about fifty feet away. John Cornelius, who directed the rescue work, was the first to notice the bodies and with the aid of the other workers the remains were carefully taken to shore and sent to the city, where they are in charge of Mr. Cornelius and R. J. Reid.

The lake was very calm during the early morning which was a great aid in the work, although the wind ruffled up the surface just before the bodies were found. The search for Mr. Sakell's body is being continued. Owing to the fact that he swam a considerable distance away from the scene of the accident, the exact whereabouts of his body are not known.

W. Karis, one of the occupants of the boat that carried the three unfortunate girls, and who was rescued from the water a few minutes after the tragedy, is now in the Hotel Dieu as a result of exhaustion and exposure. He was reported to be resting easily on Monday afternoon.
