It is officially announced by United Church officials that the whole of the province has now been subdivided into Presbytery districts for one United Church of Canada, and that the Presbyterian and Methodist churches will hold their early autumn meeting at the same places, with joint meetings in the evenings, These meetings will commence or August 28th, when #ddresses will be delivered by Rev. Dr. C. E. Manning, Secretary of Methodist Home Missions Board, and Rev. C. D. Donald of the Presbyterian mission field in Central India.
