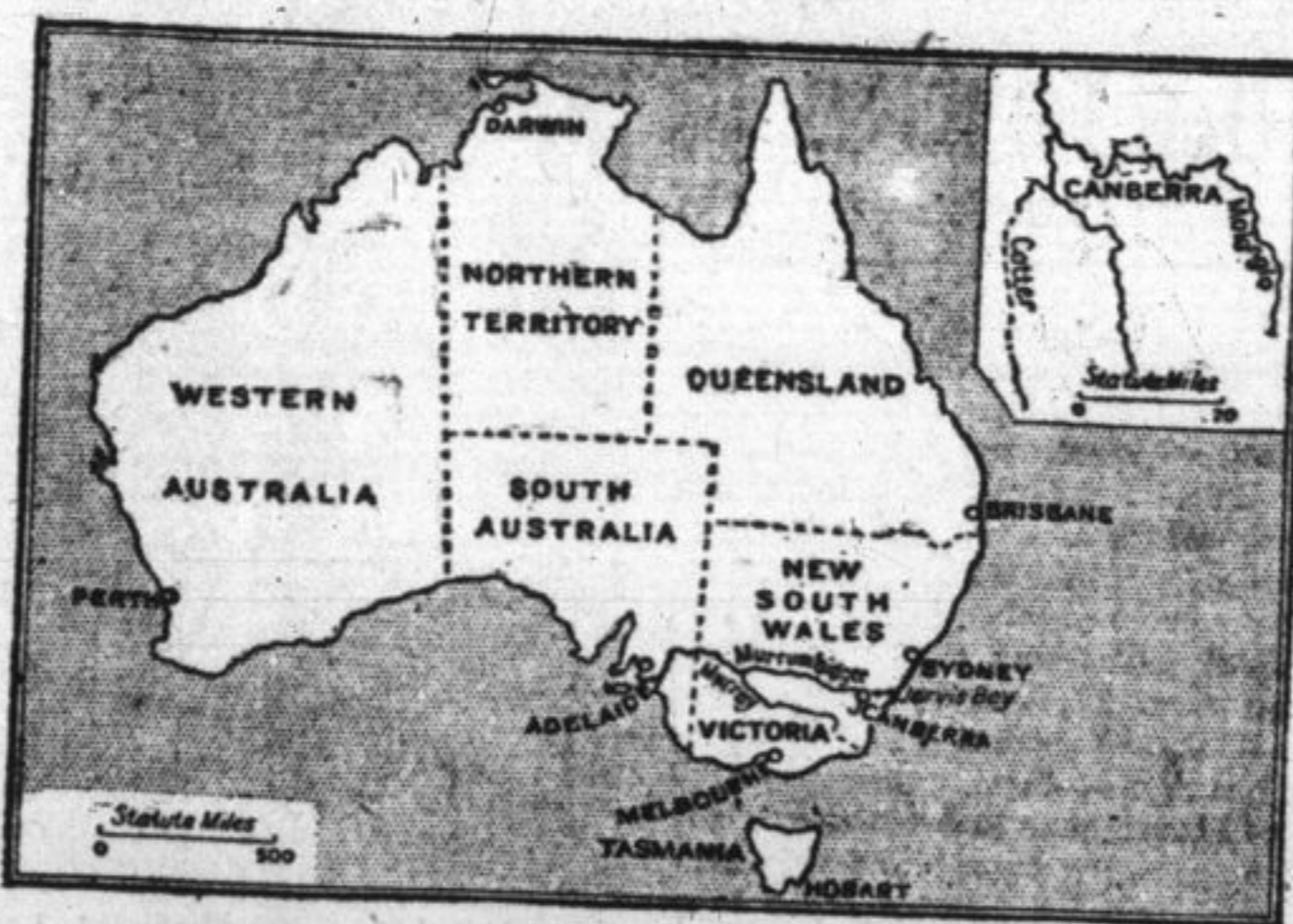

UNITED CHURCH PLANS STARTED IN MANITOBA

Officials Announce Presbyterians and Methodists Will Soon Meet Jointly.

Toronto, Aug. 22. — United Church of Canada plans have been already initiated in Manitoba, where the Presbyterian and Methodist churches have agreed to make their presbytery and district boundaries coterminous.

It is officially announced by United Church officials that the whole of the province has now been subdivided into presbytery districts for the United Church of Canada, and that the Presbyterian and Methodist churches will hold their early autumn meeting at the same places, with joint meetings in the evenings. These meetings will commence on August 28th, when addresses will be delivered by Rev. Dr. C. E. Manning, Secretary of Methodist Home Missions Board, and Rev. C. D. Donald of the Presbyterian mission field in Central India.
