WAGE WORKER PROSPERS.

According to the report on wage conditions issued by the National Industrial Conference Board, American worker is at present more prosperous than he has been years. His earnings have risen much more rapidly than his living expenses in 1923 that his real gains are higher than at any time in re cent years. The board finds that the excess of advancing wages over advancing living costs was between 16 and 17 per cent. greater in May, 1923, than in June, 1920.

statement from the board, "wages capacity for employment in industry have been rising. Many plants have announced increases of 10 per cent. 18 per cent, and even more. How much of this is not gain to the wage earner and how much merely compensates him for increased living costs are important questions for consideration. 
