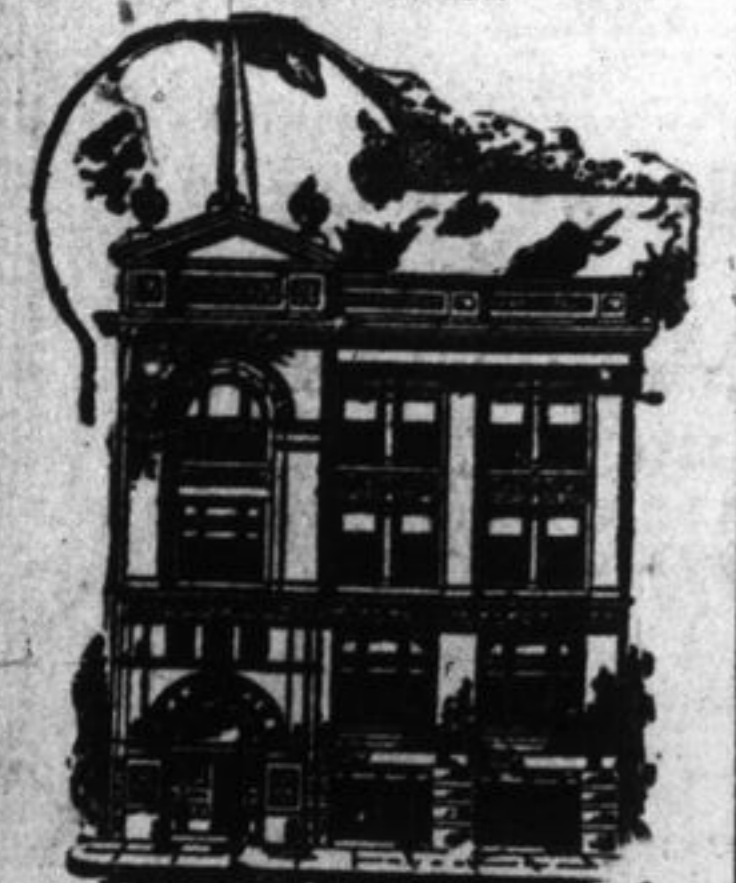

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Canadian Questions and Answers

Q—What was the extent of labor strikes in Canada in 1932?

A—While the number of strikes and lockouts in Canada during 1932 was only 85, as compared with 145 during 1931, the number of workers involved in 1932 was 41,050 as compared with 22,932 and the number of working days lost amounted to 1,975,276 as compared with 956,161 during the previous year.

Q—What is Canada's gold production?

A—Canada was the only country to show a marked improvement in gold production in 1932. The Dominion now ranks second highest producer in the Empire, and third in the world.

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
