FRENCH DOUBT RUMOR BERLIN WANTS PARLEY

Paris Government Awaits Actual Move Through Diplomatic Channels.

Paris, Aug. 28.—Rumors from various sources that Germany is preparing to open direct negotiations with France for a settlement of the reparations situation were treated with great indifference in official quarters where it was said that there was only one serious way of opening negotiations, and that was for one of the parties to address the other through regular diplomatic circles. Until this is done the French foreign office will remain skeptical to any other signs of Germany's intention to talk. Participation by German manufacturers and industrial leaders in the Franco-Belgian administration of the Rhineland and Ruhr railroads, which it has been reported has been suggested by the front of Hugo Stinnes, who would act as the representative of the German interests, is regarded here as a Stinnes' dream.

Herr Stinnes, alone or even representing all the industrial leaders of the Ruhr, it is contended here, could not furnish the assurances that France requires. Premier Poincaré desires to deal with those who are responsible for all of Germany, a high official said, and if Stinnes and his colleagues want to end the occupation of the Ruhr they can help best by doing their share to aid the Berlin government pay reparations.

News off the Wires In Condensed Form

A committee of the C.N.R. employees is in Toronto drafting a wage scale containing a demand for higher pay.

The Standard Oil Company, of New York, is to increase the capital stock from \$225,000,000 to \$235,000,000.

At Flushing, Holland, Maharaja Gaekwar of Baroda, said to be the richest prince in India, died on a journey from Berlin.

Str Edmund Walker, president of the Bank of Commerce, says that there is no cause for worry about bank affairs throughout Canada.

Pres. Charles Stewart, a Rochester banker, committed suicide after he had shot and killed Horace, his 14-year-old son, and wounded Walter aged 9, another son. He was deranged, following his wife's death.

Fourteen persons are recovering from injuries received in automobile mishaps in Rochester, N. Y., and vicinity, over the week-end, which caused two deaths, the heaviest week-end toll of the summer.

Hazel Mockett, sixteen-year-old Billings' Bridge girl, who was criminally assaulted several weeks ago, has positively identified William Swimmings, 70 College avenue, as her assailant, according to the Ottawa police.

William Larocque, 406 Nelson street, Ottawa, railway mail clerk, was arrested in the office of Henri Fortier, district superintendent of the postal service, charged with defrauding His Majesty's mail. He pleaded guilty and was allowed out on bail.

John James Ross, engaged in farming and ranching in the west for the last thirty-one years, was accidentally drowned in the Red Deer River on Saturday. He was born at Douglas, Renfrew county, sixty years ago. A widow and eight children survive. One brother resides in Ottawa.

Died Suddenly at Frankville.

Brockville, Aug. 28.—On Sunday the sudden death occurred at Frankville of John R. Bryan, at the residence of his son, Edgar Bryan. He was born at Morton seventy-three years ago, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Bryan. He had followed farming all of his life and was one of the leading men of Kitley township. He is survived by his wife, four sons and one daughter. They are Messrs. William and Edgar Bryan, Frankville; Alfred E. Bryan, Philippsville, and Albert E. Bryan, British Columbia, and Mrs. M. Dillon, Ellenville. He was a Methodist in religion and a member of the church at Frankville. In politics he was a staunch Conservative.

Canadian Locomotive Company, Ltd. is having a very good year, though it is doubtful if the annual report which should be issued shortly for the twelve months ending June 30th, will reveal all of this. The large orders for railway equipment received from the C.N.R. and C.P.R. are in hand, but only a small part of the business will show as a credit in the statement as at June 30th. In the six following months, the big part of the benefit from these big orders will accrue. The fiscal year ending June 30th, 1924, should be a big one for this company.

No Appointment Yet.
Toronto, Aug. 28.—Although it is an important position, the post vacated by William Meath, superintendent of the employment service of Canada, who leaves this evening to resume his duties as a member of the federal pensions appeal board on Wednesday, will not be filled for some weeks. An announcement to this effect was made by deputy minister of labor, James Ballantyne.

UNITED STATES CHIEF CUSTOMER OF CANADA

United Kingdom is Second—Trade With The Empire Is Increasing.

Ottawa, Aug. 28.—During the twelve months ended July, the United States was Canada's best customer, taking Canadian goods to the value of \$402,156,905. The United Kingdom came next, purchasing Canadian produce valued at \$356,061,673. During the same period, Canada bought from the United States to the amount of \$595,414,601 and from the United Kingdom to the value of \$153,002,578.

Canada's trade within the empire is increasing. For the twelve months ended July, Canada exported to other parts of the empire, goods amounting to \$453,437,899. This is in comparison with \$354,992,074, the figure for the corresponding twelve months previous. Imports from British Empire countries during the two twelve months periods were: Ended July, 1923, \$195,811,190; ended July, 1922, \$153,185,581.

\$5,000,000 Insurance On Life of Dr. Banting

Toronto, Aug. 28.—Life insurance policies amounting in all to the sum of five million dollars have been placed on the life of Dr. F. G. Banting, discoverer of insulin. It is understood that the premiums are being guaranteed by the Rockefeller Foundation. The statement is made here that Dr. Banting thus becomes one of the most heavily insured men on the continent.

Sensational Strike of Gold.
Spokane, Wash., Aug. 28.—A strike of sensationally rich gold ore is reported at Roseland, British Columbia, and verified by Bunker Hill and Sullivan Mining Company officials. The ore is so rich that the railway refuses to handle it, and is being taken to the smelter by automobile trucks under heavy armed guard, it is reported.

The I. K. L. mine at Roseland, where miners have been passing within a few feet of the strike for nearly a quarter of a century, is said to be the scene of the find. The event recalls the strike in the Lerol mine nearby which resulted in its sale to English interests for several million dollars, mining men say.

Broke His Arm.

Perth, Aug. 28.—Returning from an inspection of the premises preparatory to locking up for the night, Harry Timmins, manager of the "Ferry Inn", at Rideau Ferry, slipped on a step in the dark and broke his arm.
